News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Monday of last week Reuben Cameron, about eighty-six years old, who has ferried passengers and freight to and from the river boats for a number of years, was coming out to meet the steamer May Queen, when his boat was upset either by the wash of the steamer or by some accident on his part, and he was drowned in full sight of those on the steamer.

Thomas Donnelly was sentenced to two years' imprisonment Wednesday, for assaulting Chief of Police Tingley, of Moncton.

While Mr. Holly B. Wasson, clerk with T. B. Barker & Sons, St. John, was helping to hoist a heavy counter up stairs in their warehouse, on Walker's wharf, the rope broke and the counter fell on Mr. Wasson, badly bruising him and fracturing his leg, near the ankle.

Bert Watson, the sixteen-year-old son of Joseph Watson of this city, was drowned Wednesday. He was carrying the mail between the city and Lower St. Mary's, and on account of the high freshet having overflowed the bridge which crosses Sterling's Creek, between Gibson and St. Mary's, he had to leave his wagon and cross the creek in a boat. He got safely across, but in returning the boat was capsized, and Watson was drowned.

All the granite factories at St. George are actively at work.

A. B. Jones of Beulah, Kings Co., has caught eighty-seven muskrats this spring.

Last autumn and winter, with 175 snares, William Plummer of Jacksonville, C. C., caught 205 foxes.

Fairville had a fire Thursday, the house of Mrs. O'Brien being destroyed. Furniture burned too. Small insurance.

The lieutenant-governor has removed the following persons from office:

William E. Thistle as an issuer of marriage licenses at Hardland, Carleton Co., having moved away from the place.

George R. Burt and James A. Gibson as issuers of marriage licenses for the County of Carleton.

On Monday of last week, Weldon Stairs, of Campbell Settlement, working in Draper's saw mill, his foot strap caught in the pinion on the end of the shaft. The shaft was revolving rapidly and the strap was wound up, breaking the young man's leg in two places. The broken bones protruded nearly six inches through the flesh. The suffering man was taken to his home and a doctor sent for. He lingered in great pain until evening, when death ensued. He was eighteen years of age.

The Commercial Hotel, Campbellton, N. B. was gutted by fire Saturday morning. \$3,500 insurance. H. R. Murray, who ran the hotel, had no insurance on his furniture.

Nova Scotia.

Captain McNeil, Antigonish, who died on Sunday, was 100 years of age.

Albert Fultz, a plumber and gas-fitter of Halifax, committed suicide Wednesday, by drinking a cup of muriatic acid. He had been somewhat despondent of late. He leaves a wife. He was 42 years old.

Rev. R. Arnold, of Glen Margaret, while getting on an electric car in Halifax, Thursday, fell and broke a leg.

The Shelburne Budget understands that parties in that town are about entering into a contract with the Nova Scotia Southern Railway Company to grade the line from Shelburne to Indian Gardens, including the building of culverts, masonry for bridges, and ties, all of which is to be completed this year.

A monster lobster was recently caught off Yarmouth harbor by Eben Crosby and his two boys. It was a male measuring three feet in length, and with a width from tip to tip of spread claws of nearly seven feet. It weighed twenty-five pounds. It is believed to be the largest lobster ever captured.

The largest halibut shipment ever made to Boston at one time from Nova Scotia was made by the steamer Boston on Saturday from Yarmouth. Some 30,000 pounds went through from Halifax.

John Renner, a teamster in the employ of the Halifax Carriage Company, Thursday, while hauling a load of 20 barrels of cement along Water street, was thrown under the wheels and badly crushed. He died a short time after.

A Halifax despatch, correcting the statement that the Imperial Military Authorities had condemned as useless and were about abandoning the Citadel, says: The policy of the authorities now is to rely for defence on the strong batteries on both sides of the outer harbor and those on Monab's and George's islands, rather than on the citadel, which is the old centre of the defences of the station. The batteries nearer the mouth of the harbor are being strengthened. The citadel will be used as a place for extensive barracks. The Imperial Government has awarded a contract for a barracks within its area to cost \$35,000. But the citadel has not been condemned, and while the large obsolete guns which were on its ramp-

parts are being removed and will not be replaced, the authorities are putting in position a number of Maxims, which are better suited to the nature of the defence than would be carried on from that point were hostilities to break out. The authorities are vigorously strengthening the other fortifications of Halifax.

Other Provinces.

Reports from Winnipeg indicate that seeding throughout the country is a fortnight later than last year, with an increase of about fifteen per cent. wheat acreage sown, and a corresponding increase in oats and barley. The weather has been cold, with intermittent rain and snow falls.

A thousand citizens of Toronto went on strike Monday, including bricklayers, who want 40 cents an hour; cloakmakers, who demand 5 to 10 cents more per garment; moulders, who want 25 cents an hour; stone cutters, who seek 43 cents an hour, and cigar makers, who object to the number of apprentices. In Winnipeg carpenters, plumbers and gas fitters are out on strike. The latter want 40 cents where they are getting 30 cents.

When the Turnkey of Napanee Ontario jail made his rounds Tuesday morning, he found that Holden and Pare, who committed the famous Dominion Bank robbery and turned Queen's evidence, accusing Ponton, the cashier of the bank, of being implicated and who were held in jail awaiting the second trial of Ponton, May 15, had escaped. Three skeleton keys were found in an old coat in Pare's cell and the brick wall between his cell and the next one had been dug through. To scale the twenty-foot goal wall they piled up cordwood to within five feet of the top and used their blankets to descend on the side of freedom.

At Cornwall, Ont., Thursday night, the door of the safe in the railway station was blown off, and \$300 in cash secured. The job was done by experienced safe crackers. It is suspected the work was done by Holden and Pare, the escaped Napanee robbers.

The iron moulders in thirteen Montreal foundries decided to go out on strike Friday night. The Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk shops are included in the list. The men demanded a minimum wage of \$2.50 per day, recognition of the union and the abolition of jobbing. The employers concede the wages demanded, but refuse the others.

United States.

Wednesday night fire destroyed ice house owned by the Katahdin Ice Co., Bangor. Six houses were burned. There were 5,000 tons of ice, valued at about \$4,900.

Italian laborers are rushing to the United States in a vast army. Within a few days 4,955 have landed. The number of all other nationalities received during the same period reached 3,955. The immigration officials expect to record at least 21,000 immigrants for the seven days ending next Sunday night; 14,000 of these will be Italians.

Thursday, at Morgantown, W. Va., lightning struck a tank containing \$50,000 worth of oil and destroyed it. The burning tank is in the centre of a group of twenty-five. It is estimated that a dozen dwellings in the town and county were struck and badly damaged.

According to Alaska advices, a syndicate of eighty-six aliens who were excluded from Arlin has been formed to bring suit against the Canadian government for \$15,000,000. Damages are claimed for property lost by the exclusion of the plaintiffs from the famous mining district. Each alien claims \$175,000 damages as a fair estimate of the profits they would have gained by the development of their mining property.

John Bonner, one of the best known newspaper writers in America, is dead, aged 70. He was a native of Quebec.

Wm. S. Young, a lawyer, was arrested Thursday in Brooklyn charged with embezzling between \$25,000 and \$30,000 of a fund left in trust to an orphan boy.

Paul M. Chadbourne, of Saco, Me., a book-keeper, committed suicide Thursday night by hanging.

British and Foreign.

The British government has officially demanded of the Chinese government satisfaction for the recent attacks made by the rebels upon the British authorities in the Kau Lung extension of Hong Kong.

Word has been received at Cape Town that a caravan under the command of two Europeans was recently attacked near the head waters of the Ruvuma river, east of Lake Nyassa, the tribesmen killing 50 porters and capturing all the goods. The Europeans reached a fort after wandering three days in the bush.

A Cairo despatch May 3, says: Ibrahim Ali, whom General Kitchener sent upon a mission to Ibrahim's uncle, the Sultan of Darfour, has returned to Cairo. Ibrahim Ali found upon reaching Darfour that his uncle had been deposed by Ali Dinar. The latter, on the appearance of Ibrahim Ali, turned out his troops and routed the escort of Gen. Lord Kitchener's envoy, numbering 450, of whom 120 were killed.

General Religious News.

—There are now over 14,000 enrolled in the Tenth League of the Christian Endeavour Society.

—Canada has 87,000 Epworth League members, who have undertaken the support of 21 missionaries.

—One hundred and ten thousand dollars were spent last year by Southern Baptists in State Mission work.

—In the whole of Great Britain there are 2,000,000 less Catholics than a century ago, though the total population has vastly increased. In 1841 the Catholics were 26 per cent of the population of Great Britain, in 1891 they were but 16 per cent. Since 1891 the Catholics have decreased 247,000. In the United States there are 8,347,218 Catholic communicants.

—A gospel yacht now being built at Jeffersonville, Ind., will shortly make a trip to the Cuban coast. The entire crew will be ministers or mission workers, and the sole object of their voyage to make converts. The yacht is the largest ever built for the purpose. It is one hundred and sixty feet long, with an auditorium or chapel between decks capable of seating seven hundred persons. The decks will seat about one thousand more, and will be used for religious services whenever practicable. The boat is to be launched on the Ohio river, and will reach the ocean by way of the Ohio and Mississippi waters. Missionary work will be carried on along the way, and advantage taken of every opportunity to preach. Several of the workers speak Spanish. The yacht will sail under the auspices of the Gospel Yacht Association, which is inter-denominational. The crew will be supported by the members of the association and by voluntary offerings from the people with whom they work.

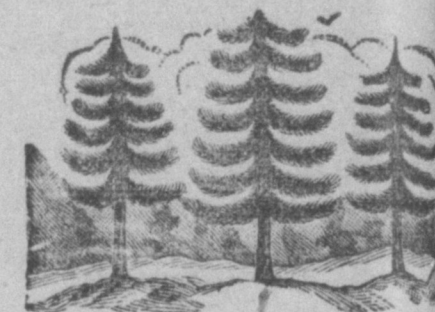

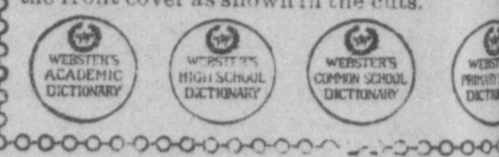
