News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

The present indications point to a much larger cut in the lumber woods this year than last. The market is good, but the supply of logs is very limited. Good hands are being offered at a high as twenty-three dollars, whereas last year's wages did not exceed eighteen.

A Shediac man named Legere has been arrested on the charge of circulating counterfeit \$2 dominion notes. Legere has given the authorities information to the effect that the counterfeit bills were being put in circulation through Nova Scotia parties living in Colchester county.

Plenty of fine fish are reported on the ribs and about Grand Manan. Herring are scarce. Small catches have been taken in some of the weir. A large catch of pollock is reported in a weir off Woodward's Cove. Net fishermen report catches in the nets small.

The Queen Hotel, Princess st., St. John, was on fire Thursday night. Three or four rooms on the third floor were badly burned, and the furniture in them destroyed.

At Northfield, S. Co., Mrs. Sarah Rochford and her daughter obstructed Sheriff Holden in his attempt to seize some property, and they are now in all a waiting trial.

The horseholders of St. John agreed last week to raise the price of shoeing to \$1.35. Within a few days the new price had to be abandoned because some of those who had agreed to it were said to be canvassing work at the old price.

Hon. A. H. Gillmor has been in Fredericton arranging with the Agricultural and Crown Land Departments for exhibits at Paris next year. The Educational Department will also make an exhibit showing the educational system of this province.

The government dredge has gone to Swan Creek, Sunbury, to clear off a bar here. The work will be done in a few days.

A. & R. Loggie of Chatham shipped seven carloads of blueberries to one address in Chicago one day last week—a trainload of blueberries. They paid freight and United States duties in advance, the amount being \$6,000.

Joseph A. McQueen was sworn in sheriff for the county of Westmorland on Thursday, succeeding his father, lately deceased.

Dr. Moore, president of the York and Carleton Railway Company, was in Ottawa last week, where he went on business in connection with the proposed railway from Cross Creek to Stanley.

There are now about 10,000 bushels of grain in the C. P. R. elevator at Sand Point, St. John.

The Yarmouth Times regrets that the neg. that which have been going on between J. W. Johns, liquidator of the Burrill-Johnston Iron Co., and George W. Johnston, with a view to the re-opening of the works by the latter, have terminated by the stockholders declining all propositions.

In Montreal, Tuesday, the assets of the Londonderry Iron Co., Ltd., (in liquidation) were sold to H. S. Holt for \$150,000 cash. The assets consist of about 30,000 acres of mineral lands and town lot in Londonderry, N. S., plant and machinery of the well-known iron making establishment of the company; the property known as the Chignecto colliery at Miramichi, N. S.; 150 outstanding claims, unsold materials, store goods and any rights belonging to the company on September 25th last. The purchaser is president of the Montreal Gas Company and is identified with many other industries.

There is a strike for higher wages in the Halifax cotton factory.

The Sydney Mines Coal areas have passed into the hands of the N. S. Steel Co.

Church robberies are rare in Halifax, but it appears that one or two have been perpetrated recently. Thursday night some one entered St. Patrick's church and stole from there pedestals of two large cherry boxes used as receptacles for contributions to the poor.

The Halifax elevator has begun handling grain. The first was put in on Friday.

In Digby, Friday night, John Gaver, aged eighty-eight, was found dead in a ditch by the roadside. There were no marks of violence.

The Lamont Glass Works, at Trenton, N. S., are again to be put in operation by the Montreal Glass Co.

Mail matter coming to Halifax at night destined for outside points, has been allowed to remain in North street station for the morning trains, watched only by the night policeman. Letters, parcels and packages have frequently been missed. Saturday night two young men, Pinder and West, were caught stealing from the bags and were arrested. Search of their homes discovered a large quantity of goods stolen from the bags, such as watches, books, etc. They sold much of the stuff.

Other Provinces.

An Iowa farmer, formerly of P. E. I., has just taken 197 young cattle from the island to his western home. He has 10,000 bushels surplus of corn for feed, and could not get cattle near his home.

In Montreal, on Monday of last week, fire destroyed the Webster hotel, on St. James street, near the Grand Trunk railway depot. Four persons lost their lives.

A double tragedy is reported from the township of Wilberforce, Ont. Wednesday morning the bodies of Mrs. William Yaster and the 17-year-old daughter were found horribly mutilated about their heads while in bed. The husband and father, William Yaster, aged about 50 years, who for some time has given evidence of insanity, is accused of the terrible deed.

In the Montreal City Court eight members of the Scotsman's crew, accused of stealing passengers' property, were discharged by Judge Chiquette, Thursday. Four more cases remain to be disposed of. Only two have been found guilty so far.

The St. Lawrence canals will attract a great deal of trade when they are completed. The capacity of the canals now nearing completion will at first be about 3,000,000 tons a year in one direction, but by degrees as ships are built more to the requirements of the trade, and capacity may be doubled, and when the power of the Falls for lighting purposes is fully used and the canal system comes under Government control, 12,000,000 tons each way may be handled.

The Sun Oil Company's premises, Hamilton, Ont., with large quantity of oil was destroyed by fire Friday night. The loss is heavy.

United States.

Capt. T. J. Lunt, of the schooner Annie Gus, fell overboard Thursday morning at his vessel was leaving Calais and was drowned. He had been sailing out of Calais for about thirty years.

The State Department at Washington is informed of the arrival at Reval, Russia, of the first steamer with American Indian crew, and that eight more shiploads are expected at the same port. Considerable interest attaches to this attempt to introduce an American product into the Russian market.

A fierce storm came on the Gulf of Mexico along the coast. Much damage to shipping is reported.

British and Foreign.

A sensation was caused in the Spanish Senate Tuesday by the

declaration of Count D'Almeida that, owing to the ignorance of the Spanish-American peace treaty commissioners, three islands of the Philippine group—the two Batanes and Calayan Islands, both north of Luzon—were not included in the scope of the treaty.

A boiler explosion at the steel works of Southern & Richardson, Sheffield, Eng., Wednesday, killed four and injured twenty persons.

It is now known that thirty-five persons were drowned and no fewer than fifty were injured by the collapse of the landing stage at Antwerp on Friday.

The first-class battleship Venerable was launched at Chatham on Thursday amid scenes of unusual enthusiasm.

There has been in Jamaica a storm raging for days. It swept over the whole island and destroyed a great deal of the banana, orange and coffee crops. From 15 to 24 inches of rain fell in two days.

A heavy gale that swept the south-eastern part of the British coast Friday did widespread damage. Although no serious wrecks accompanied with loss of life are thus far reported, the telegraph lines suffered badly, the wires being down everywhere during the greater part of the day.
