New Brunswick.

On Sunday Deputy Sheriff Foster
of Car. Co., arrested a young man 18
years old, named J. E. Pomeroy,
charged with indecent assault on a
little girl named Jessie Elliot, who is
only eight years of age. Both parties
live a little way above Glassville.
Pomeroy is an English immigrant,
about two years out. The information
leading to the arrest was sworn by Jas.
Elliot, father of the little girl. At the
preliminary examination, the prisoner
was sent up for trial.

Master Willie Dobson, twelve years
of age, second son of the late Walter
Dobson, formerly collector of customs
at Dorchester, was instantly killed in
the High School yard at Dorchester
Tuesday morning. The boys were
playing ball, and while the little fellow
was standing a short distance away
from the batter talking to his chum
the ball from the bat struck him behind
the right ear, causing instant death.

John Kellher, formerly of Frederic-
ton, fell down stairs at Rumford Falls,
Me., on Friday last and broke his
neck.

Michael Conway, a laborer of Chat-
ham was found Friday morning hang-
ing by the neck from a beam in the
loft of his father's barn, his feet barely
clearing the floor, and an overturned
chair beside them. The corpse was
cold. The rope used was a clothes
line. It is said that he had been drink-
ing hard.

Word has been received at Moncton
of the drowning of Senator A. W.
Read, of Roseburg, Ore., which
occurred on April 8th. The unfortu-
nate man was born at Hopewell Hill,
Albert county, and his widow was Miss
Eva S. Arratt, daughter of the late John
Starratt, of Hopewell Hill. Deceased
left Albert county when a young man.

A young son of J. J. Crossman
of Moncton may lose the sight of an
eye as result of being struck by a piece
of coal thrown at him by another lad.

Alex. Stronach, an I. C. R. brake-
man had one of his hands badly
jammed while coupling cars at Pot-
todicod, Friday afternoon. The thumb
and forefinger were amputated.

J. W. Taber of Fredericton, fell
from the second story of his factory,
Friday. The fall rendered him un-
conscious for a few moments, and he
was taken to his home suffering
considerable pain. Otherwise he was
uninjured.

Daniel Mercier, while moving a
small building at Dalhousie, Saturday,
was caught between it and another.
D. Cockett who was summoned found
his head and chest badly crushed and
the man profusely bleeding from the
nose, mouth, and ears. It is believed
he will not recover.

Geo. Cole, who looks after electric
lights about the I. C. R. depot, St. John
fell from a ladder severely injuring
his shoulder and hip.

Fire Wednesday morning at Halifax
destroyed the building on Barrington
street occupied by Angus Taylor,
gent's furnishings, loss \$3,300; W. H.
Cibot, dry goods; loss \$20,000; Wm.
Crowe, fancy goods, loss \$3,000;
Acadian hotel, damaged to the extent
of \$10,000; Mayflower house, damaged
\$4,000; Dr. Innis, dentist, lost \$2,000
worth of instruments, furniture, etc.;
all partially insured except Dr. Innis' property.

Other Provinces.

A freight train on the Ottawa and
Parry Sound Railway tumbled down
an embankment at Onos Lake Wed-
nesday owing to a washout, and J.
McLaren, a fireman, was killed. The
engineer was badly hurt.

On Wednesday Benjamin Parrott
Hamilton, Ont., was found guilty of
the murder of his mother and sentenced
to be hanged on June 23rd. Parrott,
while drunk, hit his mother on the head
with an axe.

W. A. Dube, train despatcher on
the Grand Trunk Railway for the past
twenty-five years, has been appointed
superintendent of the Intercolonial
Railway between Montreal and Lewis
succeeding Ouellete.

C. G. & E. J. Eaton's lobster factory,
near Georgetown, P. E. I., was burned
to the ground Sunday night.

Mr. Orlard, school inspector of the
district of St. Hyacinth, was found
drowned near St. Mathias, Riverview
Co., Que., Monday morning.

The election in Brockville, Ont., on
Thursday resulted in a Liberal victory
by a majority of 248, the vote being
Conservative, 1,752; White, 2,503.

Jacques Boileau and his wife, were
on Thursday lodged in Hull, Que., jail
on a charge of murdering Boivin
Slongue, their adopted child, at Boivin
Settlement last week.

Supt. Fitzhugh, of the Grand Trunk,
at Toronto has been appointed vice-
president and general manager of the
Central Vermont Railway headquarters
at St. Albans, Vt.

United States.

Fire at Newcastle, Pa., Wednesday
destroyed the large department store
of E. J. Acady. Loss, \$100,000.

Zemon Pelletier, and Michael H.
Thiebaul, were found dead in their
room at the White House, in Flint
Village, Mass. Wednesday morning,
the cause of death being illuminating
gas. Pelletier was first to go to his
room, and it is supposed that Thie-
baul blew out the gas when he
retired a few hours later.

The farm buildings of Isaac G. Babb
on Spring street, Westbrook, Me.,
were burned to the ground Tuesday
afternoon.

Whitaker & Delancy's glue works at
Tacoma were burned Monday. Loss
\$100,000.

The dwelling of Tristan T. Monroes,
Bath, Me., was burned Monday after-
noon, causing a loss of \$3,000.

Richard Fitzgerald, aged 16 son of
M. H. Fitzgerald of Augusta, Me.,
while attempting to board a freight
train in the Maine Central yard
Monday afternoon, fell beneath the
wheels and both arms were so badly
mangled that they had to be amputated.
It is thought that he will recover.

The hat factory of James Marshall
at Fall River, Mass., was destroyed
by fire Tuesday morning. Loss \$50,000.

While paying a brief visit to a
neighbor Sunday night, the house of
Mrs. Jacob Lesch, in Pittstown, Pa.,
was destroyed by fire, and her three
children were burned to death.

In a train on the Burlington
Railroad, Thursday night, a fireman
was killed and two of the trainmen
injured.

The jury in the case of Senator
Quay, of Penn., charged with misap-
propriating state funds, returned a
verdict of not guilty Thursday.

A fire in the hospital of the
penitentiary on Blackwell's Island
Thursday afternoon did damage to
the amount of \$20,000.

Rev. Robert Ryland, probably the
oldest Baptist clergyman and educator
in the United States, died at Lexing-
ton, Ky., Sunday, aged 94.

James W. Dudson of Boston is held
in \$10,000 bonds on a charge of
forgery. It is alleged that he added a
forgery to a mortgage of the Massa-
chusetts Title Insurance Co. on June
10, 1897.

B. N. Legislature.

MONDAY.—Mr. Lawson committed
a bill amending chapter 53 of 59 h
Victoria relating to collectors of rates
and constables in Victoria county.

Mr. Venoit committed a bill to
amend chapter 34 of 61st Victoria, so
far as relates to the country of Glou-
cester.

Also a bill to exempt a pulp industry
at Bithurst from certain taxation.
Mr. McKeown, in absence of Mr.
Purdy, committed a bill to amend
chapter 68 of 35 h Victoria, and
chapter 89 of 38 h Victoria.

Mr. O'Brien (Northumberland) com-
mitted a bill authorizing Northumber-
land county council to control and
regulate peddling within Northumber-
land county.

Mr. Whitehead committed a bill
amending an act incorporating the
Shear Broom Improvement Company.

Mr. Carvell committed a bill
authorizing the town of Woodstock
to take a vote of the ratepayers on
question of taking stock in a pulp mill
or other industry to an amount not ex-
ceeding \$50,000.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson thought the
proprietary of passing legislation
erecting towns and cities to be com-
peting in local industries, as this
bill proposed, was very questionable.
Mr. Carvell said the town council

was unanimous in favor of the bill.
He (Carvell) must confess that he saw
a great deal of force in the remarks of
the premier and would not be unwilling
that the matter should stand over so
that he would have opportunity to
confer with the town authorities.

Adjourned.

WEDNESDAY.—Mr. Hazen charged
that Mr. Emmerson had given the con-
struction of iron bridges to personal
and political friends without tender
and in dereliction of his duty, paying
two, and even three times the market
rate, for the personal benefit of those
doing the work, and supplying the
material. He further charged that
alterations were permitted after con-
tracts had been awarded, lessening the
cost to the contractor, but not to the
province, in all these things the provin-
ce being defrauded out of large sums
of money.

These charges were detailed at
length. A committee with Mr. Carvell
chairman appointed to investigate.

THURSDAY.—Mr. Hazen presented
his inquiry with reference to Succr
Brook Bridge, Petersville, Queens
county.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson said the tenders
were four in number: Anderson &
Gay, \$300; Chas. W. Anderson, \$250;
William Howe, \$243; Daniel E. Smith,
\$290. Hemlock abutments were called
for. Accompanying the tender of
Chas. W. Anderson was the offer to
put in cedar abutments instead of
hemlock for this amount of \$250. He
had accordingly awarded the tender to
Mr. Anderson, thinking it was cheaper
and more in the interest of the
province.

FRIDAY.—The municipalities com-
mittee recommended the bill giving
Chatham power to issue bonds for
\$110,000 to instal a sewerage and
water plant.

SATURDAY.—On account of the
important business interests of the
members and agreement was made
between the Premier and Mr. Hazen
to defer the investigation of the bridge
charges until next session.

Mr. Humphrey made his inquiry:
Have contracts been let for any other
steel bridge superstructures than the
Kingston bridge? To whom have
such contracts been let? What is the
length of each span, and the estimated
weight of metal in each and the total
cost of each superstructure?

Hon. Mr. Emmerson said he could
not understand the inquiry as it read.

Mr. Humphrey said he meant since
the close of the fiscal year.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson said he thought
the Brockway bridge had been con-
tracted for before the close of the
fiscal year, and if that was so then
there had been no contract let since
other than for the Kingston super-
structure.
