careful censorship of the despatches from the seat of the war has been maintained. The correspondents from the front are not allowed to write about the Boers. They get no more than enough of their own news. What ought to be said—what is fact and worth saying—is authorized by the Chief. And we may be sure that all is going well.

The week the Boers have been fighting about, more or less, is not so much as in the preceding week. Lord Roberts is, evidently, not disturbed by the movements of the enemy, if, indeed, he is not so happy to have them as they seem to be. A Saturday despatch says:—"The forward movement of the Boers is checked." This means that they are not fighting, but are preparing to head off their advance and bar their way to vulnerable points in the line of British communication.

Lord Roberts is evidently preparing a movement on a large and comprehensive scale. He will not move until he is ready, and then he will move with striking effect. The Monday news is that Wepener is the only centre of operations in South Africa, and that the news from that place is very contradictory. The London Telegraph's Town correspondent, in a despatch dated Sunday, sends a report which is admittedly not confirmed.

Mr. Kruger has been defeated. He has been captured many prisoners. There are no news from other sources of later date than Saturday. Major Dalgety was reported to be holding his own, having lost only four days' fighting only. He has been killed and 132 wounded. Brabant with his whole force of 1,000 mounted troops left Aliwal North on Saturday and moved in the direction of Rouxville, presumably to join Major Dalgety. Gen. Chemsides with the third division was still at Mafeking Saturday afternoon. It is not known whether he has since moved to co-operate with Gen. Brabant.

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interview at Bloemfontein. He said:—"The original plan of the Boers was to overrun all Cape Colony but, on becoming involved in the siege of Kimberley and Ladysmith, the burghers found the design spoiled. To this I attribute the Boer failure to conquer the British. I expect the war to last until Christmas."

The Militia Department has received a despatch from Lord Strathcona asking that fifty additional men be sent out for Strathcona's Horse, to fill any possible vacancies caused by sickness or casualties. They are being enlisted now.

The strength of the Colonial forces in the South Africa, or under orders for the field, was stated the other day by Mr. Wyndham to be 29,273, and provision has been made in the British Estimates for 35,000. The number is large, but it is insignificant compared with the number that the Colonies could supply, and would gladly supply if permitted.

The "Monterey," with the Strathcona Horse, reached Capetown on the 10th inst. All were well. On the voyage 163 horses died.

Lord Roberts has issued a warning to the Cape Colonists that any further acts of hostility will be treated with the utmost rigour of martial law.

The additional fifty men for the Strathcona Horse will probably sail from St. John by the Lake Huron on the 25th inst.

Kroonstad, the town to which President Steyn has removed his capital, is on the Valsch river, and has a population of about 2000. It is 4500 feet above the sea level, and 870 miles from Capetown.

Mafeking is still besieged. The garrison has been suffering severely from the lack of bread and a mixture of oats, bran and mealies was doing duty for the article which is described as "coarse in substance, of the color of ginger-bread and of the consistency of Norwegian pine."

It is now winter in South Africa. The First Canadian Contingent is now reduced to 715 effectives. 40 were killed. Some have died from illness. The rest have been laid up from exhaustion, wounds, or sickness.

Of the 50 prisoners recently taken by the British at Boshoff nearly all were Europeans, principally French.

There are now fifteen grandsons of the Duchess of Abercorn serving with the British forces in South Africa.

Dr. Ryerson, Canadian Red Cross Commissioner, wired from Bloemfontein on the 12th that eighty Canadians are in the hospital suffering from a mild attack of enteric fever.

It is reported that the Transvaal Secretary Reitz has announced that all Britishers and Americans, with a large proportion of the Germans, will be expelled from the two republics within a fortnight.

The Milwaukee, which took part of the Canadian second contingent to Africa, carried a full load of Boer prisoners to St. Helena, reaching there about the 10th. Longwood, where Napoleon was confined, will not be occupied by Cronje, but by the officer in command of the British troops. Three acres of Deadwood plain have been fenced with barbed wire, and within this enclosure the prisoners will be located. Guards will surround it.

The five Fredericton men who went to Africa to fill vacancies in the first contingent, have been insured by the City Council.

The loss of horses of the British forces in Africa is estimated at about 5000 a month. The climate is very hard on them.

Thousands of horses are being bought for Great Britain in the various parts of the world. The War Office purposes to land at Capetown within five or six weeks 20,000 horses, which will be carried in twenty-three transports sailing from New Orleans, Buenos Ayres and Australian ports.

Replying to a deputation in Cape Town a few days ago, Sir Alfred Milner said:

"Never again" must be the motto of all thinking and humane men; but not from lust of conquest or a desire to trample on the gallant, if misguided. There must be no compromise or patchwork in the settlement, and no opportunity for misunderstanding, intrigue, the revival of impossible ambitions or the accumulation of enormous armaments. The British will no longer tolerate dissimilar and antagonistic political systems in a country which nature and history have declared to be one.

In these utterances Sir Alfred Milner speaks for the imperial government, and utters, also, the strong feelings of the people throughout the British Empire.
