News of the Week.

New Brunswick.

Mrs. Edward Hicks of Petitcodiac was burned to death Friday by the ignition of her clothes while working round the kitchen fire.

The smelt fishing on the north shore reported very good this winter.

The total receipts at the patriotic concert at Fredericton, last week were \$900, and the net proceeds, which will be donated to the patriotic fund, will be \$240.—Gleaner.

Williamson Fisher has been appointed a member of the Board of School trustees, Woodstock, in the room of Wendell P. Jones, whose term expired. George A. Secord of Apohaqui has been appointed a provincial constable.

At a meeting of the stove founders of the maritime provinces, held in Moncton last week, it was decided to advance the prices in stoves five per cent, and furnaces of all kinds ten per cent. The uniform price list for stoves was also agreed upon. Practically all the stove founders in the provinces were represented.

The I. C. R. authorities are taking no chances of their employees or passengers contracting small-pox on the company's trains. Every passenger car that arrives in St. John from the east is immediately run out into the yard and thoroughly fumigated by the mechanical department. The same course is being pursued at Moncton and other places where there is any possibility of danger. In addition to this every trainman, conductor and brakeman has been or must be vaccinated or resign his job.

Messrs. John C. Chiboun, Walter S. Logan, James Edward Calhoun and Chas. S. D. Joy, all of New York, and Henry F. Puddington, of St. John, are seeking incorporation as the Provincial Coal Company, Ltd., to carry on a general coal mining business in the Province of New Brunswick. The capital stock is \$1,000,000 in \$100 shares. Moncton is the chief place of business.

Nova Scotia.

The Scott Act fines in Windsor, N. S., for 1899 amounted to \$1,50; expenses, \$407.70.

The assessment of the town of Windsor, N. S., is stated by the assessors as follows: Real estate, \$1,014,420; personal, \$409,267; income \$33,600, making a total of \$1,456,287.

Jas. Brown of Wallace Bay, was thrown from his sleigh and seriously injured. One week after the accident he died.

The daily average of freight cars crossing the Strait of Canso the past thirty days has been fifty-five.

Halifax was again visited Wednesday by a heavy southeast gale and rain storm. A well known sea captain says that during the last fortnight the wind in Halifax had changed almost every four hours.

The Dominion Steel Company have about one hundred and sixty men employed in constructing a railway to George's River, C. B., for the purpose of reaching their best lime stone deposits. The Nova Scotia Steel Company have also a number of men employed in stripping off the surface of a lime stone deposit which they have secured at that place. It looks as if the rich deposits of mineral at George's River are about being developed.

During the month of January there were 104 deaths in Halifax, as against 91 for the same month last year. A large percentage of the deaths were young children. The death rate from pulmonary diseases was exceptionally large.

The Milwaukee, which is to take the next lot of Canadian soldiers to South Africa, arrived in Halifax Sunday.

Last year's apple crop in Nova Scotia exceeded 400,000 barrels and sold at from \$2 to \$3 per barrel.

Says the Yarmouth Times: "Hay of fair quality is bringing \$12 per ton in the barn, while the best grades bring \$15. Before spring the price will probably advance to \$18."

Last week Meyers Mulhall of Liverpool Thompson of Kentville, Davison of Bridgewater, Robinson of Annapolis, Stoneman of Yarmouth, and Rufus Curry of Windsor were all elected by acclamation.

It costs Toronto \$36,800 a year for the care and maintenance of the new city hall.

Seven hundred employees of the Montreal C. I. O. Company's mills at Valleyfield, Que., went out on strike on Tuesday, demanding an increase in wages.

During a tornado Monday night an express train on the Newfoundland railroad was lifted off the track and despatched in a bog some distance away, only the engine holding to the rails. The track was not disturbed. The baggage car took fire and was destroyed, with its contents, including the whole colonial mail for Canada and the United States. Nobody was injured.

O. Thursday Raymond Prefontaine, Q. C., was re-elected mayor of Montreal by 3,000 majority.

There have been 196 cases of small pox in Mont Carmel, Kamouraska county Quebec.

United States.

Three dwellings were burned at Eastport, Me., during the heavy gale Tuesday morning, the occupants escaping in their night clothes.

The project of bridging the Hudson River between New York and New Jersey seems about to be actually undertaken. \$60,000,000 is the estimated cost.

The steel department of Phillips, Nimick & Co's Rolling Mill, at Pittsburg, Pa., was wrecked Monday and a dozen men injured by an explosion of a battery of four large boilers. The loss to the plant will be enormous. Five of the injured men were mutilated almost beyond recognition. One man died and more deaths may result.

A Bangor letter says: "The pulp and paper industry in Maine has for months suffered severely from drought—the most remarkable drought ever known in this state since pulp mills existed here. The spring of 1899 was dry, likewise the summer, and the fall brought little relief. At present the pulp mills are unable to keep the paper mills supplied, and large quantities of ground wood pulp are being imported from Nova Scotia."

In an effort to stamp out the plague at Honolulu it was decided to burn one of the blocks in Chinatown. The fire gained such headway that the fire department could not control it. Soon the whole Chinese quarter was in flames. Twelve blocks were destroyed. Over 6,000 people were rendered homeless.

A runaway electric car on the D. Y. and Xenia Traction road left the track Saturday evening was demolished. A man and woman were instantly killed.

One life was lost, one fireman injured and several overcome by smoke in a fire at Lowell, Thursday, in which Marjia's block, Merrimack street, was destroyed. Mrs. Bridget Grady, forty-eight years old, perished in the flames. The total loss is about \$100,000.

Small-pox is killing Indians by the dozen on the Colvin reservation, Washington. The Indians refuse to submit to medical treatment.

British and Foreign.

Recent storms in Algeria have killed 60 per cent. of the sheep and 35 per cent. of the neat cattle in the country, partly through consequent famine. The estimated loss is \$0,000,000 francs (10,000,000), which falls with crushing force upon the agricultural population.

The strike of carpenters engaged on the exposition buildings in Paris came to an end on Monday. An increase of ten centimes per hour for work on buildings twenty-five metres or more in height was recognized by the arbitration committee as a just demand, such work being considered dangerous.

There are 5,000 cases of influenza in Madrid.

London had a heavy snow storm Friday night, and the storm extended to many parts of the country. In some places railways were temporarily blocked, and telegraph wires were down.

Mr. Estabrooks foresaw that a change would come about, not only in the importing business, but in the blending and packing. He also recognized that Ceylon and Indian teas would come more and more into favor with our people. He therefore got into touch with the trade in the countries of growth, procured the best blending and packing machinery to be had in London, and made the tea business a specialty. He has been rewarded by a rapid and steadily increasing development in his business, and T. H. Estabrooks' Red Rose and other teas are well known and largely sold all over the Maritime provinces. He has three travellers constantly on the road.

The distribution will consist of samples of oats, spring wheat, barley, field peas, Indian corn and potatoes. Each sample will weigh three pounds. The packages will be sent free to applicants. It is announced that the samples will be sent only to those who apply personally. Only one sample of one sort can be sent to each applicant. Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent any time before the 15th of March, after which date the lists will be closed. Parties writing will please mention the sort of grain they prefer and should the stock of the variety named be exhausted, some other good sort will be sent in its place. Letters may be sent free of postage.
