In every Methodist church in New
Zealand intoxicating wine has been
excluded from the Lord's table.

The Episcopal Church is doing
excellent work in Alaska. She has
there 14 stations, 12 churches, 8
clergymen 394 communicants, \$63,000
worth of property. They are extend-
ing their work.

It is stated that over 100,000
Roman Catholics in France have be-
come evangelical Protestants within
the past twenty-five years. The
movement in this direction is most
pronounced in the department of Lot.

A Bible-class of 2,000 and a Sun-
day school with an average attendance
of 3,000 are, in deed and in truth, a
marvelous demonstration of executive
wisdom and ran-and-file devotion. The
Wanamaker Sunday school has no par-
allel anywhere. And yet it must be
true that a similar consecration of
talent and energy and time and money
will achieve marvels everywhere and
always.

Every year has marked some ad-
vance in usefulness of the Y. M. C. A.
in the United States and Canada as
well as in Great Britain. From statis-
tics before us we are glad to see that
there is advance at every point. In
the last year the number of associa-
tions has increased to 1476. The
membership exceeds 260,000. Build-
ings whose value exceeds \$20,000,000
belong to the associations.

During the reign of Queen Victoria
the Scriptures were translated
into more than 238 new languages.
The British and Foreign Bible Society
added that number to its list of issues
since 1837. The whole list of lan-
guages last year was 373. The total is-
sues exceeded 5,000,000. In the year of

CARL.—Miss Alma E. Carl, of Petit-
codiac, N. B., came to Hartford from
Boston, where she had been visiting her
brother, to spend a few weeks with friends.
She went to the home of Mrs. Jerusha
Colpitts, who had been a neighbor of Miss
Carl in New Brunswick. Three of Mrs.
Colpitts' children were ill, Charles having
just been removed to the Hartford Hospi-
tal, Emma ill at home, and Lizzie recover-
ing from what was at first thought to be
malaria fever, but which proved in all
cases to be typhoid fever. Finding Mrs.
Colpitts in such trouble, Alma remained
with her to assist in caring for the sick,
but the sanitary condition of the house proved
too much for even healthy, strong constitu-
tions, and Mrs. Colpitts, with her youngest
son, Alvin, were removed to the Hartford
Hospital. On Oct. 7th Miss Carl, also, was
taken ill, and was removed to the Hospital
on the 9th. It was then thought best to
remove little Emma to the Hospital, and
the eldest son, Manfred, with his wife and
six-year-old Lizzie changed their place of
residence. On Oct. 25th Emma died and her
body was taken to Elgin, N. B., for burial
by her brother Manfred, whence he had
returned but a few hours when his mother
passed away, Oct. 31st. Again he made
that sad journey to place his mother's
body by the side of her late husband, and
had returned but two days before Miss
Carl passed away. Alma had been in the
hospital but six days when her fever be-
came so high that it was thought impossible
for her to live and her brother was called
from Poston; but that strength and care of
health, which are characteristic of our New
Brunswick girls, proved stronger than the
disease, and slowly the fever receded. She
began to throw off the disease and gain
when a relapse occurred; again that stored
up strength was the victor and she began
to recover rapidly; but on Nov. 9th compli-
cations of peritonitis and perforation
occurred and made her case hopeless. The
writer was called to the Hospital and told
that she could live but a few hours. I
expected to find her delicious and a wasted
body, but I found her looking the picture
of health and her mind and memory clear
and strong. I remained with her that day
till midnight. She did not realize her con-
dition and talked to me of her plans of
going home as soon as she was well enough
and the messages she wished sent to her
father and sisters. During the afternoon
an opportunity was given me to ask her of

cious of her true condition. Two Sisters
of Mercy came through the ward, and she
said to me—"They often come in here and
they are nice, but I guess there is no dan-
ger of making me a Catholic," and smiled.
I replied, "No, that is all settled, isn't it?"
She smiled again as she said, "Yes, settled
long ago, and oh, how good it is to know I
don't have to worry about that when I am
sick." "Then Alma, I said, whatever is
God's will is all right." "Yes, it is all
right." While absent from her bedside for
refreshment the writer's pastor, Rev. H.
M. Thompson, called to see her. After
praying with her she told him of her hope
and that all was well whatever God would.
