MISSION NEWS AND NOTES.

—Twenty-two male missionaries and two hundred and seventy-one native teachers labor amongst the eighty thousand inhabitants of the New Hebrides islands. The number of communicants is over two thousand, whilst one thousand during the past year renounced heathenism. These simple Christians of the South Seas put us to the blush in their devotion and liberality. Last year they gave nearly \$3,000 to send missionaries to those who are still heathen and cannibals on the unevangelized islands. This is about \$1.50 a member.

—Not a single medical missionary, not a single mission hospital was known, a hundred years ago; such things were hardly known fifty years ago. Now 355 hospitals are managed by missionaries of the Gospel and 753 dispensaries. The number of missionary physicians is 702. And besides there are 33 medical schools on mission ground, where 589 natives are being trained in medicine. This illustrates the present spirit of missions.

—Mr. John R. Mott, M. A., is now on a tour of mission stations. He will spend one month in Japan, and another in China. Thence he hopes to go to Ceylon, India and Burma. He wishes to hold in each country conferences comprised of leading native Christian students and instructors and educational missionaries, and to conduct evangelistic campaigns in two or three principal student centres of India. He will be in Great Britain in February. Mr. Mott travels in a double capacity; he is general secretary of the World's Student Christian Federation as well as foreign secretary of the American Y. M. C. A. International Committee.

—Mr. Henry Richards, a missionary in Africa, in an account of a marvelous work that has been called "A Pentecost on the Congo," gives this testimony as to the value of native preachers. He says: "We have fifty earnest and devoted preachers and teachers, some of them men of great power, and all of them have won many souls. Most of the two thousand people that have been baptized at our station have been brought in by the Christians themselves. He tells of one man who had been such a notoriously wicked man and persecutor of Christians that, on his conversion, he was given the name of Paul. This man had such a zeal for the salvation of souls he was ready to undergo any privation and persecution that he might reach and save some souls. He suffered from cold and from hunger, going two days at a time without food; he was so eager for souls that he did not take time to go for food. He has over five hundred Christian church-members that he himself has been the means of bringing to Christ." Thousands of native preachers are ready for service, only needing financial support.

—A writer in a Methodist magazine, discussing the question, "Do Missions pay?" makes the following statement: "In the year 1899, according to the statistics of the Ecumenical Missionary Report, \$19,000,000 was spent on foreign mission work by the Christian church. As a result of the labors of the faithful men and women supported largely by this money, the membership of the church was increased by 84,000 in the mission fields. The following year, in our own Methodist Church, in the seven central and western conferences, we raised and spent within our own borders no less than \$2,269,700, and increased our membership by 2,421. From these figures we see that it cost us \$937 for each member added to our numbers at home, while abroad it only cost \$226 per member. Considering the difficulties of mission work, we may well say, 'Missions do pay.'"

The above is about the average showing in comparing the cost of converts at home and on the foreign field, and yet some of the faultfinders are forever crying out about the great cost, and extravagance, and poor returns for money expended in foreign missions.

The trouble with a great many people is, that they want to have their religion on the life insurance plan. By paying a small premium every now and then in the way of church attendance, they hope to secure at death a large amount of religion, but do not want it delivered before them. But religion is an interest for this world as well as for the next, and those who make light of it now will not be apt to have much of it then. Now is the time to be religious, and so, also to be happy. John Wesley once said that many 'think of being happy with God in heaven, but the being happy with God on earth never enters their thoughts.' We must first have God with us here if we are finally to be with God there.—N. Y. Observer.
