News of the Week

NEW BRUNSWICK

The war office has asked the department of agriculture to purchase half a million bushel oats to be shipped from St. John.

Reports from the upper St. John are to the effect that the river had not risen sufficiently to enable anything worth speaking of to be done to the logs, now high and dry. It will take a rise of four feet anyway, and the rain only raised the river two feet. Lumber is piled up high out of the water on the Aroostook Falls.

Two more cases of smallpox were discovered in St. John last week, one on City Road and one on Waterloo St.

Mr. Bradford Palmer, Hampstead was badly injured by an infuriated bull a few days ago, and has since been confined to his bed. The animal fortunately had no horns, but striking Mr. Palmer tossed him several yards bruising him badly.

St. John is confronted with what may develop in a few days into a dangerous epidemic of smallpox. Four new cases were reported Friday, one being on Waterloo street, one on Marsh street, and the others in most serious locality—among the nurses of the General Public Hospital. The whole hospital has been strict quarantined. In all there are about ninety persons affected by the hospital quarantine. These include the two resident physicians, Drs. Lunney and Bayfield, the matron and ten regular nurses, exclusive of those ill, two district nurses will also come under the quarantine, fifty-seven patients and a staff of twenty assistants, cooks and general help. Among all these no cases have as yet developed, but there will of course be great anxiety until the time of probation is over.

Besides smallpox, diphtheria is quite prevalent in St. John.

After a four days' investigation by Coroner B. S. Palmer into the finding of a child's skull at Hampstead last September, the jury returned a verdict last week to the effect that the cause of death and the parentage of the child were unknown to them.

A house belonging to John Roberts across the river from Hampton, was destroyed by fire Monday. All his household effects were destroyed.

The case of George Freeman against Fred Stevens, of the Hartland Advertiser, for libel was before the court in Woodstock last week. The Advertiser printed a story about Freeman having been concerned in the death of a man named Sergeant several years ago. The judge suggested a settlement. Freeman stated that he only wished to vindicate his character. Mr. Stevens will publish a satisfactory retraction and the matter will drop.

As rather striking sequel to the recent McLaughlin murder trial at St. Andrews was the marriage last week of George McLaughlin tried for murder Harris McLaughlin, and the widow of the dead man.

At Woods cove, Thursday, Joseph Irvine, a moulder was found dead on the sawdust pile back of Moore's mill.

A revolver and a box of cartridges were found beside him. The Coroner's jury said it was a case of suicide.

The following Dominion Government appointment has been gazetted: George Rufus McDougall, of St. Martins, to be a sub-collector of customs.

NOVA SCOTIA

The contract for a new government steamer for use in connection with the planting and protection of oysters in the maritime provinces has been awarded to the Burrell Johnson Co. of Yarmouth.

Thursday Henry Grubey, died of small-pox at the hospital in Halifax.

The Duke of Teck's watch, the valued heirloom supposed to have been stolen from the Ophir at Halifax, was found after the vessel sailed for Newfoundland.

It is announced that the Sissiboo Pulp and Paper Company, Weymouth N. S., has sold the entire output for the current year to a German firm.

The Messrs. Churchill of Hantsport are going into the culture of Angora goats. Last week they received a herd of eleven from Maine. The herd consisted of one male and ten females.

Over 130,000 quintals of fish valued at more than half a million dollars, is the catch of the Lunenburg fishermen at the Grand Banks this year. Out of the 100 schooners and 1,800 men left the port in June, there was not one casualty.

Mackenzie & Mann are suing John Ryan and Alan R. Macdonell, who held a sub contract for construction of a large section of the Inverness and Richmond Railway, Nova Scotia. They claim \$200,000 for failure of Ryan and Macdonell to complete their contract in time. Ryan and Macdonell have a counter claim for \$195,000.

J. W. Bigelow, president of the Fruit Growers Association, says Nova Scotia will have 300,000 barrels of apples for export this year, and at present prices they will be worth a million dollars. Many single orchards will bring from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

The war department has just awarded a contract to the Victoria machinery dept for the construction of two screw steam launches for marine mining service in connection with the defence of Esquimaux. They will cost \$50,000.

A fleet of sealing schooners, six in number, have arrived at Victoria, B. C., from the Behring Sea, bringing 2,213 seal skins, valued at about \$45,000.

The gross earnings of the Montreal street railway for the year are \$135,000 greater than last year, but the net earnings are only two dollars greater.

The Council Bluffs and Kansas City passenger train was wrecked Friday. Thirty-six passengers were injured. 11 of whom will probably die.
