DOMINATIONAL NEWS.

ENTH DISTRICT MEETING.—The
th District meeting convened
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Business meeting opened at 9 o'clock
Monday morning, Rev. A. J. Prosser
in the chair. Prayer by Dr. Hartley.
The committee to summarize the
church reports submitted a report. Of
the fifteen churches comprising this
District, all sent written reports. Six
ordained ministers have been working
all the year in the District; several
of the churches, not having had regular
pastoral care, have had labor of visiting
brethren part of the year. The num-
ber added by baptism was 28; by letter
21; died 21; withdrawn, by letter, to
join other churches, 12; leaving a net
increase 16. Total number of resident
members 1170. Paid for the support
of the ministry \$3747.56, for current
church expenses \$977.00, on church
debt \$710.00, on improvements on
churches \$1361.35, parsonages \$950.00.
The following amounts are very in-
complete, as many churches did not
state in their report the amount given
to the different funds: Home Missions,
\$53.35; Foreign Missions, \$27.40;
Conference fund, \$169.49; Sunday
schools, \$588.00; Students' fund,
\$13.00; Ministers' relief. — Chris-
tian Endeavor, \$92.00. Total amount
received by the Womens society \$251.
32, which is a little in advance of last
year. The church property is valued
at \$35,300.00; parsonages, \$4200.00.
Eleven churches report having monthly
conference meetings, 8 churches have
the Lord's Supper administered at
least once during the year, while 4
have it monthly, 10 churches have
prayer meetings. The principal fea-
tures of the report brought under dis-
cussion were the necessity of all the
fields having pastoral care, and the
urgent need of a larger circulation of
the INTELLIGENCER in order that our
people may be more interested in
denominational work. There is a lack
of interest in Home and Foreign
Missions. On motion it was resolved
that A. J. Prosser be authorized to
visit Deer Island, Grand Manan and
Beaver Harbor to aid them in getting
a pastor. The following brethren were
elected as delegates to the General
Conference: A. Dakin, J. C. Mac-
nichol, E. H. Elmhurst, Guy Keir-
stead, G. H. Duval and James M.
Small; their substitutes are J. W.
Stover, Wm. Morrish, Alex. Calder,
Geo. Gaskin, Geo. Simpson T. Robert-
son. The Executive of the District:
bro. G. A. Hartley, C. T. Phillips,
Wm. Peters, A. J. Prosser, and David
Long.

Meeting adjourned to meet with the
Seal Cove church at such a time as
they may decide.
