News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Moncton Times says: The outcome of the investigation into the narrowly averted collision between the C. P. R. and No. 2 train, near Petticoat, a short time ago was the suspension of the driver and conductor on No. 2 for a month and the brakeman on the same train for two weeks.

They have some old people at Arthurville V. Co. Mrs. Elizabeth Grant began her 82nd year on 23 inst. Her sister, Mrs. Anne Brown, will be 84 in May. A brother J. D. Giberson is in his 88th year. John Camber, the oldest inhabitant, is in his 96th year.

Patrick E. Mont, 50 years of age, was crushed to death a few days ago by a pile of logs in the lumber woods 15 miles from Dalhousie. He leaves a wife and twelve children.

George Bick, farmer of Upper Dorchester, died at his home there last week as result of injuries received while working in the woods. He leaves a wife and three children.

There is a movement in Moncton wards to remove civic administration from party politics. The Board of Trade has led this movement. A list of candidates has been presented.

John Houlahan, a man nearly seventy years of age met his death by drowning in Lovitt's slipp St. John Wednesday. He was hauling snow, and slipped over the wharf.

General Manager Pottinger has issued an official circular to the effect that E. G. Russell has been appointed manager of the Intercolonial railway. Mr. Russell has taken charge of the mechanical department and running of the road generally. His headquarters will be at Moncton.

The total amount deposited in the Savings Bank, Fredericton, during the month of February was \$8,954. The imports for the month of February show a considerable increase over the corresponding month last year.

Archibald Park of St. Martins mate of the small schooner Maud, lost his life in Friday's storm by being knocked off the schooner's deck while on the way to St. John from St. Martins.

OTHER PROVINCES.

Fifty-four cases of small pox have been discovered in twenty villages along the C. P. R. between Rutherford and the Soo, Ont.

John F. Lindsay, a Moosomin, N. W. T., business man, has inherited a fortune of \$100,000 by the death of an Australian relative.

In Ontario last year the total deaths numbered 25,241—being 11½ per 1000, an extremely moderate rate. Tuberculosis destroyed more lives than all other contagious diseases combined.

There are now 80 known cases of small pox in Ontario, and quite a number of suspected cases are being watched.

UNITED STATES.

In New York Wednesday while waving his hand to his wife and child, who were waiting to welcome him to dinner, Joseph Burns, a motorman, was struck and instantly killed by one of the electric cars of the line upon which he worked.

A fire Thursday destroyed a large portion of the business part of Mantua, Ohio. The loss will amount to \$75,000, partly covered by insurance.

At Terre Haute, Ind., on Tuesday, Geo. Ward, 27 years old, a colored man, who confessed to having murdered Ida Finckstein, was taken from his cell in the jail and hanged by a mob. His body was then burned.

Infuriated because she refused to elope with him John D. Cassels, a sewing machine salesman at Springfield, Mass., shot and fatally wounded Mrs. Mary Lane at her boarding place Tuesday night and then drank carbolic acid. Neither can recover.

Two dead, three badly hurt and a passenger train burned is the result of a head-on collision between a passenger train and a freight on Thursday at Coal Valley, five miles from McKeesport, Pa.

Nebraska's State penitentiary, three miles from Lincoln was almost destroyed by fire Thursday night. The loss will exceed \$300,000. There was no disorder among the convicts, who were guarded by militiamen hastily summoned from Lincoln.

At Danistur Iowa, Saturday, Henry Warn, a German farmer, killed his son cremated the body in the house, which he fired, set fire to his cattle sheds, corn crib, barn and every building on the place and then shut himself in the burning barn, where his headless and charred remains were found by searchers Sunday afternoon.

Twenty-six miners perished in the fire in the sixth level of the Diamondville coal mine, at Kremmer, Wyo.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Electric street railways have been instituted in Cardiff, Wales, Mannheim, Germany, and in Auckland, New Zealand.

The census taken Dec. 1 1900, shows the population of the German empire to be 66,345,014, of which number 27,731,067 were males. Thirty-three of the largest towns have populations of over 100,000 each, or an aggregate of 9,108,814. Since 1895 the increase in the population of the empire has been about 4,000,000, or 7.78 per cent, the highest rate of increase for any quinquennial period during the last 30 years.

Chih Shu (former grand secretary) and Hsu Cheng Yu (son of the notorious Hsu Tung) were publicly beheaded at Peking on Tuesday.

A British expedition of 500 men

after making an eight days' march of 114 miles into the Somali country, to punish them for killing Sub-Commissioner, Jenner, was attacked February 19 at Sanaa, twenty-one miles from Affaddu and lost 17 men killed, including Lieut. Col. Macdonald. The Somalis were beaten off with the loss of 140 men killed.

The day a fire in a residence in six Birmingham tenements resulted in six men and women being burned to death.

There were 800 deaths in Bombay city during two days of last week. Of this number 400 were due to bubonic plague.

N. B. LEGISLATURE.

The Legislature met on Thursday. Mr. C. W. Robinson, of Westmoreland, was elected Speaker, in place of Mr. Hill who had resigned. The Governor's Speech spoke of Queen Victoria's death, and of the Canadian volunteers in the South African war; promised details of the arrangements made with the governments of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island for the establishment of a school of agriculture, and a measure concerning the development of the coal areas of Queens and Sumbury, mentioned the Rothery vote making scheme and promised legislation to provide a legal list, and promised, also, bills to create District Courts, and for the introduction of the "Torrens" system of Land Registration.

The address in reply to the Governor's speech was moved by Mr. Copp, and seconded by Mr. Ryan. Mr. Hazen followed. Messrs. Copp and Ryan commended the government's policy. Mr. Hazen criticized it.

FRIDAY.—The standing committees were appointed. Several notices of inquiry were given.

Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill relating to provincial revenue and accounts. He explained that the bill provided that a statement of the annual receipts and expenditures of the province be published in the Royal Gazette within 60 days after the close of the fiscal year.

The debate on the address was resumed by Mr. Tweedie. Several other members spoke.

The House adjourned till Monday.
