

GENERAL RELIGIOUS NEWS.

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—Christian Endeavor is now on the rock of Gibraltar. A society of 54 members has been organized.

—During the last century the Bible was translated into 250 languages, and is now accessible to nine-tenths of the world's population.

—The various Methodist bodies in England number about 900,000 members. All the leading nonconformist bodies report considerable increases during the past year.

—Australian Baptists are said to have increased twenty per cent. during the past nine years. During the same period, according to our Year Book, Canadian Baptists have increased fifty per cent.

—Of the 392,000,000 population of Europe it is claimed that 180,000,000 are Roman Catholic. They have 162,000 churches; 248,000 priests; 31,000 houses of religious orders, and 59,000 students in theological seminaries.

—In Prussia, changes of faith are recorded by the State. During the seven years, 1890-97, the number in the old Prussian provinces leaving the Catholic Church for the Protestant was 40,577; the number leaving Protestantism for Romanism was only 4,442.

—The British and Foreign Bible Society is engaged in preparing a revised and enlarged edition of its valuable booklet, "The Gospel in Many Tongues," containing a brief passage from the New Testament, reduplicated in about 380 various languages and dialects.

—It is estimated that the value of church property in the world is \$6,000,000,000. This includes church edifices only, and not the great number of parsonages and other institutions owned by the church. The sum invested last year in Christian work of all kinds, including church buildings, is estimated at \$1,009,369,494. Both these sums are almost beyond comprehension.

—The oldest Protestant Church organization in America is the Dutch Reformed Collegiate Church of New York. It was founded in 1628 for the early Dutch settlers. It received a charter from William and Mary in 1896, and its bell, which was cast in Amsterdam, has been in use since 1728.

—The Baptists of New Zealand are not a strong body, but they seem to be pushing their work with a good deal of vigor. This last year they have had a net gain of fifty-eight. The total number of churches is thirty-four, and of their only eleven have a membership of over 100. The strongest church is in Auckland, gathered by Rev. Thos. Spurgeon. The total membership of all the churches is 3,594 of which the Auckland church has 578.

—The Irish Evangelical Society and Congregational Home mission, after having suffered deficiencies in its accounts for several years, is now enjoying a balance, with an ordinary income in advance of that of the past four years. The contributions of the mission churches last year averaged \$10 per member. The society has 12 ministers, 4 evangelists, 20 lay preachers, 15 central churches, and 56 preaching stations, 12 Sunday schools, 514 Church members, and 572 pupils in Sunday schools.

—The latest reports from the Twentieth Century Funds in Great Britain are as follows:—The Congregationalists have \$2,740,000 promised—more than \$100,000 more than the amount aimed at. The Baptists have \$1,812,000 promised of the \$2,250,000 sought. The Wesleyans have \$4,610,000 promised of the \$5,250,000 they hope to raise. In the contributions of the Congregationalists and, we believe of the Methodists, there is included what is pledged on church debts. All the Baptists raise goes for objects outside the contributing church. For all these denominations, this is very generous giving.

CAMPO BELLO, N. B.—When I die I have many reasons for wanting to go to heaven, one of which is that I may "go no more out" from a land where "the inhabitant shall not say 'I am sick' and where 'there shall be no more death.' Since last October I have attended eleven funerals, and for the last month alone visited more than sixty people confined to their beds on account of sickness or infirmity.

We attempted special work the first of March, which, on account of sickness in the community, after two weeks, had to be discontinued. The result of the special effort was not what we looked and prayed for, but just how much good was done the light of eternity will alone reveal. A few were visibly helped. Seed was sown and some, I hope, fell on good ground and will in God's own time spring forth and bear much fruit to His honour. The attendance at all the church services is good, especially to the Sunday evening service when, under favourable circumstances, the house is full. We have a number of very faithful workers here, who are always found, both in and out of the church, adorning the profession they have made by a well ordered walk and conversation. I appreciate the counsel and encouragement I so often need and get from our very excellent deacons, Savage and Newman. The parsonage, save a few touches necessarily postponed until Spring time, was completed the first of the year, at a cost of about eleven hundred dollars. A slight debt is upon it, which we hope to reduce one half this year. I believe in the building of this parsonage the difficulty in securing a pastor, which the church has in the past sometimes experienced, has in a large measure been overcome. In many respects it is a desirable field of labour. I am enjoying the work and like the place and people.
