News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Jas. Belyea, proprietor of Rockdale
Hotel, Brown's Flats, had a narrow es-
cape from drowning a few days ago.
He was out rowing in a small tender
when it capsized, throwing him into the
water. He managed to cling to the bot-
tom of the boat. Three boys, Frank
and Edwin Brown, and William Wilcox,
heard his calls for help, more than half
a mile away, and after some difficulty,
got a boat launched and rescued him
exhausted and benumbed.

At Lower Corner, Woodstock, Tues-
day a vacant house owned by Henry
Upham was burned.

Fredericton is assured of an exhibi-
tion this fall. Mr. John A. Campbell
M. P. P., says he has received assur-
ance from the government that \$2,
500 and probably \$3,000 will be grant-
ed.

At Chatham, Tuesday, W. B. Snow-
ball was elected mayor by a majority
of 59.

Friday morning early a fire broke
out in the village of St. Marys, opposite
this city which destroyed four buildings
viz., Andrew Harrison's dwelling,
buildings owned by Joseph Smith and
occupied by Jas. Bailey and Mrs.
Milton Brewer, and one occupied by
Albert Boone.

Woodstock will have an exhibition
this fall. The provincial grant is \$800.

An I. C. R. east bound train, fast
freight from Montreal to Halifax, was
wrecked at Meadow Brook Thursday.
Several cars left the rails and three
cars loaded with general freight were
badly smashed up.

Fredericton Gleaner, Thursday:
The arrival of the steamer Aberdeen
on Tuesday and the David Weston
yesterday marks the earliest opening
of navigation for many years. The
dates of the arrivals of the first steamer
for the past five years were: 1896,
April 20th; 1897, April 27th; 1898,
April 20th; 1899, April 24th; 1900,
April 23, and in 1901 the first steamer
arrived on April 16th.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The Windsor Marine Insurance
Company at its annual meeting held
last week, decided to wind up its af-
fairs.

John Musgrave, I. C. R. inspector
at Halifax was jammed between two
cars and so hurt that he died.

An immense whale incasuring 85
feet over all and 12 feet in diameter
was captured last week in Cobequid
Bay.

The body of an old gentleman
Ichabod Powell, who disappeared from
his home near Oxford was found after
twelve days about two miles from Ox-
ford. Death from exposure.

Freeman Slipp, Dalhousie, was
fined \$50 or fifty days at Annapolis for
killing a moose contrary to law.

The following have been appointed
justices of the peace:—W. H. Troop,
Halifax; Saml. J. Moore, Shubenac-
die; and Robb. Patterson, South Alton
Kings.

At Sydney, C. B., Thursday, a car
loaded with coal ran away in the pit
at the Caledonia mine, causing the
death of Alex. Powers. A man
named McDonald escaped with a
broken leg.

The bricklayers of Halifax have de-
manded an increase in wages of from
30 to 36 cents per hour.

Amherst has a police sensation.
Tim O'Hearn, a liquor dealer, sen-
tenced to 30 days' imprisonment, was
not locked up until last week, a fort-
night after he was sentenced, when the
fact that he was not a prisoner
first became known.

OTHER PROVINCES.

A bill has been introduced in the
P. E. I. Legislature to amend the road
act. Manual labor will be abolished
and a tax of 75 cents and 25 cents will
be placed on males over 21, the horses
over three years.

A return issued by the provincial
board of health shows 2,484 deaths re-
corded in Ontario during February, as
against 1,962 in the corresponding
month of last year. Pneumonia and
other lung troubles are the chief
causes of the great increase. There
were 125 cases of smallpox in Ontario
on March 15, a considerable falling off
since the last report.

The Roman Catholic church at Farn-
ham, Que., was destroyed by fire,
Tuesday. The loss is \$50,000 and in-
surance \$20,000.

UNITED STATES.

Fire at Bangor on Tuesday destroy-
ed a large stable owned by G. M.
Taylor, with 15 horses belonging to
John F. Woodman.

Texas has over 1000 murders a year.
It is as certain as figures can make it
that murders increase where law is lax.

If the United States government esti-
mate of the winter wheat crop of
that country is realized it will be the
largest ever known, 460,000,000 bushels
against 330,000,000 bushels last year.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The Danish government is consider-
ing the recent somewhat modified pro-
posal with regard to the sale to the
United States of the Danish West In-
dies, which is considered likely to lead
to a satisfactory termination of the
negotiations. Official circles are now
nearer an agreement than at any pre-
vious time.

A few days ago there was launched
at Belfast the largest steamship in the
world. The new vessel is named the
Celtic and belongs to the White Star
Company. The Celtic has nine decks
and a capacity for 1,859 passengers.
She will carry a crew of 335 men.
Her tonnage is 3,600 greater than that
of the Oceanic, and nearly double that
of the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, and
her displacement and tonnage are 10,
300 over that of the Great Eastern.

Maritime Prohibition Association, of
which Rev. E. Crowell, Yarmouth, is
President, and W. L. T. Reed, Fred-
ericton, Secretary, will hold its Annual
Meeting Tuesday, May 7th, 7.30 p. m.,
at Truro, N. S., (Temperance Hall,
Walker St.) There will be reports of
officers, election of officers; discussion
of and determining plan of future
work, &c.

"The object of the Association is to
secure such united action by the
electorate as shall overthrow the liquor
traffic in Canada by prohibitory legisla-
tion."

"The Association shall be composed
of delegates from Maritime, Provincial
District County and other temperance
and religious organizations, not pri-
marily." All such bodies are urged to
send delegates for united action. It is
hoped there will be a large and repre-
sentative gathering.
