News of the Week

NEW BRUNSWICK

There are four smallpox patients at Partridge Island quarantine Station St. John.

A few days ago the Collector of Customs at St. John received through the mail an envelope, with not a mark or sign to denote the sender, in which was a \$1,000 bill. There was a line stating the money was "for the province of New Brunswick," but there was nothing to indicate whether it was for the Customs or otherwise.

Friday as old Mr. Gray, of Pembroke, was driving a sloven over the river bridge, the horse suddenly started and he was thrown between the body of the wagon and the wheels, sustaining severe injuries, including a fracture of the skull.

The report of the secretary of the Victoria Hospital, this city, for 1901 just published shows that during the year 268 cases were treated—165 medical and 103 surgical. There were 16 deaths, but as many of the patients entered as a last resort, this may be considered a low number. There were 27 typhoid fever patients, four of whom died. One hundred and ten of the number treated were free patients.

At Humphrey's Mills, near Monton, Fred Miller, aged 18, was drowned.

Saturday. The mill hands were breaking up ice in the pond in order to save the wasteway, when Miller jumped on the ice beside one of the men, it gave way and he disappeared.

Councillor Gilbert Crandall of Springfield, Kings Co., was drowned on Saturday afternoon within sight of his own home while endeavouring to cross the swollen tide of the Belleisle in a canvas canoe. He and R. Neily were crossing to secure some logs that seemed in danger of breaking loose.

The water was high, the current strong, and there was a high wind. The canoe swamped and capsized. Mr. Crandall sank immediately. Mr. Neily was able to swim to the canoe and clung to it. A boat put out and rescued him.

The heavy rains of last week did much damage. Washouts on the C. P. R., between St. John and Fredericton interfered with trains for a day and a half. On the I. C. R. and Central R. R. trains were stopped. Part of the C. R. R. bridge across the Washademoak was carried away. In many parts of the Province there has been injury to highway bridges. Just how extensive the damages are cannot be told till the water subsides. The St. John river is practically clear of ice from Fredericton to St. John. Above Fredericton there is a great jam of ice extending from Springhill to Bear Island. It is reported that many barns on Bear Island and other islands in that part of the river have been carried away. At Stanley great damage, and other points on the Nashua. The Stanley bridge was carried away. At Keswick the water is very high. The Upper Keswick bridge has been swept away.

NOVA SCOTIA.

An Amherst delegation was at Ottawa last week urging the taking over the ship railway at Fort Lawrence and converting it into a shipping port for Amherst and making railway connection over the ship railway and the I. C. R. to Halifax.

The wreck of the steamer Tiber has been definitely located at White Point, five miles west of Canso. It lies totally submerged.

Two brothers, Donald and John Smith of Port Morien, were drowned Tuesday while duck shooting at Sand Lake, a few miles from Port Morien. It is supposed that one of them went out on the ice and broke through and that the other went to his assistance.

The Government has introduced a bill amending the N. S. railway act of 1886. The new bill provides that besides the usual subsidy, the government may give further aid in the form of loans, when there is a reasonable likelihood that the interest shall be paid.

Five cases of smallpox were found Wednesday in one house on Campbell road, Halifax.

The government makes some noteworthy grants under the head of public works. One item is \$14,000 for hospital at Windsor; another \$2,000 for a tuberculosis sanatorium; another is \$20,000 to aid in building an extension for the school for the blind. The total expenditure on roads and bridges will be \$109,690; Agriculture is \$33,000; Education \$260,000.

At Mount Uniacke gold mine, Wednesday night, the mining mill was broken into and a quantity of gold bearing quartz and valuable nuggets stolen.

Earle Pye, son of Charles W. Pye, registrar of deeds for Guysboro county died Friday as the result of injuries inflicted March 5 at Sherbrooke, by John Murdock, a lad of 16 years of age. Pye died in frightful agony. Murdock hit Pye a blow in the face with a clothes-pole, accidentally, it is said. Murdock has been committed for trial. Pye was 14 years of age.

Marconi is visiting Louisbourg and Glace Bay, Cape Breton, examining as to a place for locating his wireless telegraphy station. The work of construction is to begin at once. The towers on the two buildings will be two hundred feet high.

OTHER PROVINCES

Lord Strathcona has sent the school board of Strathcona, Man., a check for \$1,500 to be used for school purposes.

From Winnipeg a number of fatalities are reported as a result of the recent blizzard. Mrs. Mary McPherson was found dead in a snow bank on the outskirts next morning. Earnest England, a 14 year old lad, of Reston, lost in Saturday's storm, was found dead. Seventy-five valuable horses consigned to western points were frozen to death in three cars at Voss, during Saturday's storm.

The C. P. R. freight sheds at Winnipeg were burned Friday night. The loss is said to be enormous.

The Minister of Education in Ontario says he has received hundreds of applications from male teachers and could within a fortnight secure two hundred teachers of the very best standing to go to South Africa.

The dairy industry in Prince Edward Island is being well maintained, and the butter and cheese manufactured has been fully up to the standard. There were 44 factories in operation last year. The number of pounds of cheese produced was 3,554,779, the gross value of which was \$320,521.07. The number of pounds of butter made was 571,961, valued at \$119,974.87.

At Brookville, Ont., Saturday, Miss Mary Jackson, aged 20, a nurse at the general hospital, took a chloride of mercury in mistake for opium salts and expired after suffering terrible agony.

UNITED STATES

The sardine business at Eastport is dueling to the immense amount of sardines on hand.

A man under arrest at Everett, Mass., for murdering a policeman, has been identified as George Hughes, of Halifax, recently released from the penitentiary. He was sentenced to twenty years for shooting a man in Lunenburg, but was released after having served sixteen years.

Seven brave life-savers, of the Monemoy Station on Cape Cod, met death Monday of last week at their post and with them into the treacherous sea which capsized the life boat went five men from the stranded barge Wadena whom they vainly tried to bring in safety to the shore.

The United States Senate has passed the bill for the protection of the President.

The brown stone fronts of several four-story private houses on Park Avenue, New York, on Friday sank into the earth on account of undermining of the foundations by excavations for the rapid transit tunnel. The financial loss is estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000. No one was hurt.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The new railroad which will connect Havana with Santiago, Cuba, will be ready for use by the first of July.

Yellow fever is spreading at Rio Janeiro. There were four new cases and five deaths on Friday.

Great Britain, Austria and Russia have addressed a note to Turkey admonishing the Porte to keep order in Macedonia and Albania. Germany declined to join in this note.

A royal commission has been appointed to investigate the evils of alien immigration, and to advise remedial or precautionary measures. The London Standard says: "Its object is to find some method of excluding criminals without shutting out the honest immigrant."

After abnormally mild weather, the frost has now closed all the rivers of southern Russia to navigation. The absence of snow promises badly for crops.

Traffic in Switzerland has been greatly interrupted by the heavy snow-falls.

Spain is experiencing extremely cold weather. Heavy snows and hail storms at Seville and Orunna have destroyed the crops and killed some people.

There are now 609,000 native Christians in South India, double the number twenty years ago, and more than four times the number forty years ago. The higher intelligence of the native Christians is giving them a standing which is telling more and more in favor of Christianity.
