News of the Week

NEW BRUNSWICK

The manufacturing business of Ganong Bros., Limited, St. Stephen is being sought by some Ontario towns. A citizens' meeting at St. Stephen, Tuesday, adopted a resolution favoring exemption for a further term of fifteen years.

The first shipment of general merchandise to Cape Town, from St. John totalled 128 tons. It comprised chairs, desks, wood mantels, iron roofing, road carts, castings, radiators, baths, boots, barley, split peas, canned lobsters and canned meats and canned goods of various descriptions. One piano was sent in the shipment. This shipment went on March 26th. The next boat carrying general merchandise, the S. S. Degama, is due to sail April 11. From notices given and applications received, it is probable the next shipment will be considerably larger than the first.

Arthur Kingston, aged 21 years, a Canadian Pacific Railway brakeman belonging to Fredericton Junction, was killed in a collision near Grand Bay early Wednesday morning.

The catch of gaspereaux in St. John harbor is extremely light for this season.

At Moncton, Sunday morning of last week, Mrs. Gallagher died very suddenly. During the afternoon Mr. Gallagher, complained of illness. He died early next morning. He was 35 years of age, and a foreman shunter in the I. C. R. yards. His wife was about the same age.

James Colter, of Kewick, had his collar bone broken and was internally injured a few days ago by a horse he was driving running away and throwing him out of the carriage.

Fredericton's new city council has ordered the assessment for the ensuing year. The amount is fixed at \$50,300 a reduction of \$5,600 from last year.

The steamer Lake Superior which went ashore on the 30th near the Quarantine grounds, St. John harbor, is still there. The cargo is being removed.

Wednesday the Halifax Longshoremen's Union went on strike because they were refused an increase of pay. They asked for an increase from 20 cents an hour, the present rate to 25 cents, and for night work they demand an increase from 25 cents to 30 cents. They also demand 50 cents an hour from Saturday evening at 7 o'clock to Monday morning at the same hour. Some 500 men are out.

The following justices of peace have been appointed this week:—John McKenzie, of North River Bridge, C. B.; Alexander Sutherland, of Brookfield; Asa Higgins, of Belmont; Charles A. Musgrave, of Stormont.

Mr. E. D. Davidson, M. P. P., and Mayor of Bridgewater, owner of large lumber mills, was struck by a beam at his mill on Thursday and badly hurt, but the doctors say he will recover. He was knocked into the water, but was quickly received.

William Ogilvie, one of the men burned by lamp explosion Thursday morning died the same night. He was about 24.

OTHER PROVINCES

The federal government has decided to establish at Quebec a small arms factory and a Canadian Enfield factory to employ from 250 to 300 men.

Richard Frazier, an official civil engineer of the Canadian government, is reported to have destroyed a Russian boundary monument in Skagway, Alaska. It was situated eighteen miles beyond the modus vivendi line on the Canadian side. The affidavits of the witnesses have been taken and sent to Washington.

Immigrants from the United States brought small pox with them to the Prince Albert district, N. W. T., and some of the settlers in the district are affected with the disease.

The sealing steamers arriving at St. John's bring reports of tempestuous weather, and say they have not seen or heard anything of the missing Allan line steamer Huronian.

Thorvald Hansen, of Montreal, was Thursday found guilty of the murder last November of Eris Marotte, a nine-year-old boy, and sentenced to be hanged Friday, June 13th. Hansen stabbed the boy for the sake of a few cents.

Sir John Bourinot, clerk of House of Commons, had a narrow escape from death. He drank some iodine, thinking it was cascara. A doctor was summoned at once and managed to relieve Sir John and save his life. The mistake was made in the dark. Sir John's throat was burned badly.

In Montreal, Saturday, Edward Laurin convicted of manslaughter in causing the death of Geo. Smith, his father's colored coachman, was sentenced to fourteen years in the penitentiary.

UNITED STATES

Fearing he would be arrested for theft. Wm. H. Lane, a colored butler, shot and killed his employer, Mrs. Ella J. Furbush, her twelve-year-old daughter Madeline, and probably mortally wounded another daughter Eloise, aged seven, at their home in Philadelphia on Tuesday. Lane was captured. He confessed his crime.

At Atlantic City, N. J., Wednesday, twelve hotels and more than a score of small buildings along the ocean edge were destroyed by a fire which swept the beach front for two long blocks. The loss, it believed, will exceed \$750,000.

One man is dead and two fatally injured as the result of an explosion in the mills of the International Paper Co., at Rumford Falls, Me., on Wednesday. The night crew had just commenced their duties in one of the sulphite digester rooms where the paper stock is cooked, when a steam pipe in one of the digesters exploded.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The plague situation is growing worse in the Punjab, where 7,000 deaths are reported monthly.

Twenty two are dead as the result of a fearful explosion Saturday in the Nelson mine, Dakota.

It is reported from Christiania, Norway, that laborers to the number of 2,000 are being hired there, for railroad work in Canada, by an American congressman.

Six men were killed as the result of an explosion of fire damp Wednesday night in a colliery at Wigan, Lancashire.

A number of men were entombed at Dunfermline, Scotland, Thursday morning, owing to a similar accident.

News comes from Australia that the French have annexed the island of Rimitara, one of the Tubuai group in South Seas. The entire group is now under French control.

The French general election is fixed for April 27th.

The Cape and Cairo telegraph is in operation to Uji, a distance of 2,500 miles. From Uji to Fashoda is about 1,200 miles, and when this gap is covered the line will connect with the Egyptian system. Then from the heart of the continent one can communicate by wire with almost any part of the civilized world.

PARLIAMENT

TUESDAY.—The budget debate was continued by Porter and Dr. Kendall Dr. K. objects to retaliation against the United States.

He propounded the theory that free trade and direct taxation would be the right policy for Canada, but did not think the time had yet come.

WEDNESDAY.—Mr. Pringle resumed the budget debate. He was followed by Mr. Turgeon.

No business.

THURSDAY.—The debate on the budget was continued by Messrs Taylor, Scott, Roche, Demeas, and LaRiviere. Nothing else.

FRIDAY.—Mr. Fisher, minister of agriculture made his budget speech. Mr. Brodeur followed.

MISSION NEWS AND NOTES.

—In India there is only one Christian teacher to 275,000 of the population.

—The population of Polynesia at the present time is said to be about 862,000, of whom 323,500 are Christians. This is the result of a single century of work.

—During the last four years the Student Volunteer Movement has maintained five travelling secretaries, three for men's colleges, and two for women's colleges. In addition, there is an educational secretary who prepares the text-books, and a general secretary who oversees the entire work.

—It is almost exactly a century since the Wesleyans began their work in the Bahama Islands, the first missionary being a man of color, son of a Barbadian planter. Now Wesleyanism dominates the islands religiously. It has 30 churches, 12 missionaries, 100 local preachers, 3,601 full members, with about 11,000 in the congregations.

—Last year a church near Boston made its annual offering for foreign missions. It amounted to just \$100 and the pastor was not satisfied. At the communion service, a week or two afterwards, he announced the result of the collection and told of his disappointment. He wanted the gift doubled, and so earnest was he that he threatened to make it up out of his own slender purse if the church did not. The deacons hurriedly passed the basket and behold, the total offering was increased to \$350. This experience could be repeated in many churches.

—Sir Charles Elliott, writing in the London Times, furnishes interesting statistics as to the growth of Christianity in British India. Leaving out the
