NEW BRUNSWICK

The Bank of New Brunswick will open a branch in Charlottetown in a month.

Woodstock has a case of smallpox. Dr. Morris, of St. John, has charge of the patient.

Fishing is reported very poor, especially of Grand Manan, and very little has been done on the Nova Scotia coast. The results of the St. John harbor fishing have, so far, not been very satisfactory.

George Mockler and Rainsford Loveley have been appointed provincial constables for Victoria county.

At the coroner's inquest on the body of an infant recently found in an out-building of the Lorne Hotel Fredericton, the jury returned a verdict that the child had lived, but they had no evidence to show who were its parents or the parties guilty of its death.

Lewis Bliss has been appointed accountant in the Fredericton Boom Company's office at St. Mary's in succession to the late W. K. Allen.

At Dalhousie, Wednesday, John Blais was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for stealing provisions from the camps of the Prescott Lumber Co., at New Mills.

E. T. Howell, of Fredericton, travelling through the up river counties as a representative of a St. John drug firm which has no existence, was arrested Wednesday in St. John. The charge against Howell is that of disposing of a horse and carriage owned by Frank Thornton, of Hartland.

At Richibucto Thursday, the cylinder head blew out of the engine in R. O'Leary's saw mill, and the escaping steam scalded Roy Stewart, aged 15 years, so that he died.

Advices from the Upper St. John and tributaries continue to be discouraging. The lumbermen are anxious, and fear that a large portion of the logs cut the past winter will be hung up. There is still snow in the woods, and a few warm days and nights with a little rain would bring up the streams to a fair driving pitch.

It is said two syndicates interested in lumber and pulp scheme are seeking to buy the land of the New Brunswick Railway Company. The land amounts to over 1,600,000 acres.

Hans Peter Peterson, of the Danish Settlement, near Grand Falls, was stabbed by another Dane named Anderson Wednesday evening. The victim is in a critical condition. Anderson fled to the woods.

Wednesday night last Isaac Oulton, a well known rag picker and miser of St. John, was found dead in his house Douglas avenue, under circumstances that indicate that the old man was murdered. Shortly after the body was found the house was discovered to be on fire. The firemen promptly put it out. The old man's head was badly bruised and his left cheek swollen, blackened and cut. Thomas Gillespie, who lived in one of Oulton's houses, and who supplied him with meals, found the body and notified the coroner. Oulton lived in most abject squalor. He was reputed to be very wealthy. The doctor who made the post mortem examination says his death was caused by violence. The inquest was not completed at this writing (Monday).

NOVA SCOTIA

The finance committee of Sydney council estimates that the cost of constructing the Sydney streets, if they were already built to grade, would be upwards of \$125,000. The gross assessments valuation of the year 1903 is \$1,383,000, as compared with \$87,000 five years ago, and the amount to be raised by taxation is \$51,595, as compared with \$42,600 at that time.

The contractor for building Marconi's station at Table Head, Cape Breton, says the work is progressing well they are building a dwelling for the manager of the station, a workshop and engine house, and will erect four towers, each 210 feet in height. It is expected the station will be equipped

and in working order by coronation day.

The employees of the Dominion Coal Company are to demand ten per cent. on pay on all underground work.

Reuben Munroe, jr. son of Reuben Munroe, of White Head, and his man, James Munroe, of Yankee Cove, were removing lobster pots Monday morning on the fishing ground off White Island, when their boat filled and sank. Men in another boat started for the in, but they sank before help reached them.

An attempt will be made to float the steamer Mira, which is ashore at Chebogue Point, Yarmouth. The work has been undertaken by a Baltimore firm.

It is said that the shipments of deals from Nova Scotia this year will be smaller than for many years.

Another case of smallpox has broken out in Dartmouth.

At a meeting of the directors of the N. S. Steel and Coal Company, Friday the directors, it is understood, decided to extend the works at Trenton, N. S., and install a plant for manufacturing steel cars, calling for a million dollar expenditure.

A find of gold bearing conglomerate has just been made at Grand Lake, about 20 miles from Halifax. A crusher is shortly to be erected.

OTHER PROVINCES

Coopersville, Ont. a village of twelve houses and a store, built up around James Cooper's saw mills, has been wiped out by fire. Mr. Cooper, the heaviest loser estimates his loss at \$400,000.

Fire destroyed Burgoyne's grist mill, Hickey's agricultural implement storehouse, Fairley's factory and Mathew Gehan's barn at Newberg, Ont., Wednesday. Loss, \$6,000. Insurance, \$4,500.

A case of leprosy has been discovered in the Chinese colony of Montreal. An effort will be made to send him back to China.

Australia and South Africa have recently given orders for 43,536 barrels of flour to Canadian firms.

Thirty million dollars is the value of gold mined in the Klondike the past winter.

In Hull, opposite Ottawa, Tuesday of last week, Thomas Hill, his wife and their children and their hired man were all burned to death. The building was struck by lightning and caught fire. The flames spread so quickly that Hill and his family and the man, who slept in the stable, were unable to escape. Four horses were burned, too.

UNITED STATES

Fire on Wednesday all but wiped out the village of Elwood, N. J. A large saw mill, the post office and a score of buildings were completely destroyed.

The town of Clintondale, Pa., a town of 175 inhabitants, was practically wiped out by fire Wednesday. The loss is between \$30,000 and \$40,000.

Thirty-five places of business and fifty dwellings were burned at Marionville, Pa., Wednesday. The loss is estimated at \$20,000.

Last week forest fires in the central section of Pennsylvania caused devas-

tation to a vast amount of property and the loss of three lives.

Fire in the village of Crogham, N. Y., caused losses estimated at from \$250,000 to \$300,000. Twenty-one buildings were destroyed, including a church, a monastery, a convent, school building and college.

Custar, Ohio, an oil town of 600 inhabitants, was totally destroyed by fire on Friday. Loss \$60,000.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The strike of the cotton and silk workers in Moscow and its vicinity has resulted in rioting, including the plundering of houses and stores. The troops rigorously repressed the disorders. Many persons were killed or injured on both sides. Fresh outbreaks are impending. The province of Poltava is seething with discontent. Everywhere strikers are crying for shorter hours and increased pay.

The earthquake Friday evening at Mexico City covered a large extent of territory, and is reported down into Central America. The lower section of the Pacific coast felt the shock very severely, and at Tapachula, an important town near the Guatemalan frontier there was much damage to property. The loss is estimated at a million dollars.

Recent despatches from Guatemala bring further particulars of the recent earthquake there. Great damage was wrought to life and property and many cities and towns were almost entirely destroyed.
