News of the Week

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Monday night of last week W. A. Burden's barn, Saunders St. this city was destroyed by fire. Loss about \$600.00. Insured.

Barney Fisher who recently arrived from the Maine lumber woods has smallpox. He is quarantined at his boarding house in St. Marys.

An eleven-ton sloop George A. Curran, bound to Eastport from Grand Manan with a cargo of frozen herring stranded on the east side of Campobello Island during the snow storm Wednesday night. The vessel and cargo are a total loss. The crew of three men suffered greatly from exposure.

At noon Tuesday on the Kennebecasis river near Boar's Head, Townsend Logan, of St. John, north, was drowned, and his brother Rudolph severely injured. They were trying to save their nets from destruction by the running ice. Their boat was crushed

in the drift ice, precipitating them into the water. Townsend could not swim, and after battling with the ice for a short time he shouted good-bye and sank. Rudolph was badly jammed by ice, but finally got out and made his way toward Benjamin and Robert Wilson, Stephen Foster and Herbert Meade, who in their boats were trying to reach the drowning men. Townsend Logan was about 32 years old. He leaves a wife and three children.

There was a slight fire in the Woolen Mills, Woodstock, Monday night, of last week. The packing room and carding room were considerably damaged. Insured.

Tuesday morning Harry S. Miles of Oromocto, fishery inspector, died. Death was caused by diabetes. He was 54 years of age.

The Beaver Line Str. "Lake Michigan," which arrived at St. John Sunday, had two smallpox cases on board. The Str. is in quarantine, and the two smallpox patients have been taken to the Partridge Island Hospital.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Pilot Frank Thomas, who was on board the steamer Karlsruhe when her propeller touched a rock near the shore while turning in the upper part of Halifax harbor, has been suspended for two years.

Patrick Dooley was instantly killed at the Blooming Mills, Sydney, Wednesday, by being crushed beneath a piece of timber while he was loading a car.

Another case of smallpox has been discovered in Halifax. The patient is a druggist, resides on Black street. Ben Brown, the colored man who left a Grafton street and house went to Preston, has small-pox, and is in quarantine at Preston.

Richard Shepard's new hotel, on the St. Margaret's Bay road, was destroyed by fire last week.

The Halifax City Council has decided to ask the legislature to pass an act authorizing the city to expend \$5,600 annually on a free public library and thus qualify for Andrew Carnegie's grant of \$75,000 for a building.

M. O. Crowell's hardware establishment Halifax was gutted by fire Saturday morning. The stock in the building was ruined. Loss \$16,000. It is reported that the Dominion Coal Company has closed a five years' contract with the Canadian Pacific railroad for a minimum of 500,000 tons of coal and a maximum of 800,000 tons per annum at an increase of 35 cents per ton in the price. The existing contract, which expires next year, was for 250,000 tons of coal per annum.

The steamer Tiber sailed from Louisbourg Wednesday of last week for Halifax with a cargo of coal. She has never arrived. Wreckage on the coast indicates that she has become a total loss. She had a crew of 20 men; all doubtless lost. The Tiber belonged to Montreal and her crew were chiefly French Canadians. There is no longer room to doubt that the Tiber is a total loss.

The report of the Nova Scotia Hospital for the past year states that admissions numbered 137, a larger number than in any previous year. New patients 104. Discharges including deaths 142. Cured 77,—52.2 per cent. on admissions, a good record. Consumption caused the death of a considerable number.

The ten year old child of Mr. Purcell, in Richmond, Halifax was on Saturday discovered to have smallpox. There are ten children in the family. A case was also discovered in Dartmouth Sunday.

Amherst had a fire Sunday morning. The Daily press building was destroyed. The building was owned by Thomas Daulap, and was occupied by the Press, and a Chinese laundry up stairs, and the Amherst hotel sample rooms. The principal losers will be the Press people. All the stock on hand was destroyed, and also the files of the papers of many years. The

presses were only slightly damaged.

The D. A. R. has carried this season 260,000 barrels of apples for export. Twenty thousand barrels have been delivered at Windsor Junction for shipment via the I. C. R. to Montreal.

At Bridgewater, Sunday, the steamer Trusty, of the L. Have Steamship Co. was burned to the water's edge. She came up from her winter moor go late Saturday afternoon.

OTHER PROVINCES.

The annual report of the Ontario bureau of mines shows the total mineral output in 1901 was \$11,822,525, an increase of nearly \$2,000,000 over the previous year. The largest increase is in nickel, copper, pig iron and steel, which increased about 100 per cent.

A double drowning accident occurred at Canboro near Dunville, Ont. A young son of Mrs. George Brooks fell into Oswego Creek and the mother to the rescue, but both were swept away by the current and drowned.

At Mt. Mans, L. Q. fire in the house of A. B. Nohard, burned to death Mrs. Bonchard and nine children—6 boys and three girls, their ages ranging from 2 to 14 years. The father was the only one to escape.

UNITED STATES.

An explosion in the Catsburg mine of the Monongahela River Consolidated Coal & Coke Company Pennsylvania, Thursday resulted in the death of five men and serious injury of several others.

A broken rail caused a wreck on a Southern Pacific railroad near Maxon station, Texas, Friday morning. 15 people were killed and 28 were more or less injured.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The telephone service in Sweden is about to be taken in hand by the state the two telephone companies being bought out for \$650,000.

A correspondent of the Daily News says authentic reports from St. Petersburg say that the revolutionary movement is spreading in all directions and assuming serious proportions. The unrest has reached many parts of Siberia. The Governor of Tomsk has issued an order prohibiting meetings of citizens in the towns and villages throughout the province. Troubles are reported at many places in Siberia.

The viceroys of India telegraphs that the rainfall has been light and scattered, and of no benefit to the affected districts. About 359,000 persons are now receiving relief. A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, from Lahore says 3,000,000 acres of wheat in the Punjab are suffering from total drought.

Fog is general all over the United Kingdom, and is a great hindrance to all traffic. In London it is unusually dense.

The czar has contributed 150,000 roubles (\$75,000) for the relief of the sufferers by the earthquake and volcano at Shamaka.

Spain increases her army to 100,000.

Australia has suffered much from drought,—is in fact still suffering severely.

Marconi, on his way from England to the United States received signals at a distance of 1551 miles from the English coast. The letter S was caught at a distance of 2099. This demonstrates the availability of the new method of long distance communication.

N. B. LEGISLATURE.

The Legislature was opened by Lieut. Governor Snowball Thursday afternoon with unusual formality.

Immediately after the formal opening and the reading of the speech, the house was adjourned, and His Honor and Mrs. Snowball held an informal reception in the chamber. The Governor's speech mentioned the visit of the Duke of York, the death of President McKinley, the development of the dairy interest during the year, the coal areas of Queens and Sunbury and the railway in course of construction, the winter port business etc. The government will press for a position of the Fisheries award, for a larger allowance from the Dominion to the Province, and that the branch railways of the Province be taken charge of by the Dominion government railway department. Bills are promised as follows;—to amend the public health act, providing among other things for the compulsory vaccination of children attending school; to amend the law regarding investments by trustees; a Workman's Compensation for injuries Act; a bill provide for the more equitable distribution of estates of insolvent debtors; a bill to provide a forest reservation; a bill to provide for the importation of horses.
