

WARNING TO YOUNG MEN.—We have recently been informed that a highly respectable individual in this City, was about engaging a young man, in every way qualified to act as a book keeper, in which capacity his services were required, when he was apprised of the fact—that he was in the habit of visiting the grog-shops. This announcement at once terminated the negotiation. We now ask the disappointed candidate for a comfortable berth—what will the poison vander do for him? besides destroying every prospect, he may have for future advancement? The answer is obvious. A dram seller has not the slightest influence in the community—his employment enlists the sympathy of no man of correct principle, and even if he had the wish to forward the honest views of a young man, his best efforts from the nature of his position, would be at the same time suspected and utterly powerless.

Landing of the Loyalists.

The public has already been informed by our cotemporaries, that it is in contemplation to erect a Monument in some conspicuous part of this City, to commemorate the landing of the Loyalists in 1783. We are rejoiced to find that so much unanimity has been manifested, in this important and desirable movement. However the universality of the desire is not to us a matter of surprise. New Brunswick has always maintained, and justly so, a proud and honorable position amongst the truly loyal Colonies of England. And the Citizens of Saint John, whenever occasion has presented itself, have shewn themselves to be essentially BERRIS in feeling and in principle.

A Monument to the Spirits of 1783

The suggestions that have appeared in some of our City papers, to erect a monument to the memory of the American Loyalists, who sought this Province in the year 1783, as an asylum from Republican oppression, must have their due weight on the descendants of these men, as also on every British subject, who has adopted New Brunswick as his home; both should take an equal interest in this matter, because the love for Great Britain, and for her sound and lasting monarchical principles caused them to leave all and follow the British flag—no matter where they went or what privations they endured. Those men in the United States were the pillars and ground of British principles; and while there, they suffered every species of insult and persecution from their adversaries to the Royal cause; and when they found these principles uprooted, they left property, friends, and their native land, and came to New Brunswick, as an asylum from their enemies: in that revolution father was against son, and son against father, families in their various branches were divided against each other; and when those who loved their king as they loved their lives, found that the Crown and monarchical principles had departed from their country, they left the soil of Republicanism to follow in “the good old way.” Here they came, and found it a cold and cheerless uninhabited wilderness; but the British flag and British laws were here, and their minds were contented: “for God and their country” cheered them on in their necessary toils and privations, which we can only imagine, but not pourtray, until the wilderness became a thriving City and populous Province. Let us then unitedly erect such a monument to their memories, as will shew to the world how sacredly we adore the Loyalists of 1783.—Communicated.

MECHANICS INSTITUTE.—We are gratified to learn from the Annual Report of the Directors of the Mechanics’ Institute, that this very useful Institution is in a prospering state. The directors appear to be anxious to render the establishment as useful and efficient as possible. They are prudently “taking time by the forelock,” by advertising for courses of lectures for the ensuing season, which in their character will be more in accordance with the nature of the Institute, than any which have already been delivered. INSURRECTION IN DOMINICA.—The following is an extract of a letter received at Keefer’s Reading Room, Halifax:—

“Liverpool, N. S. June 23.
“Capt. McLeod, of the Brig. Nova Scotia, at Liverpool, just arrived in 16 days from Dominica, reports, that on the day he left, Martial Law had been proclaimed, in consequence of a rise among the Blacks, about 300 being assembled near the town. One of the leading inhabitants had his horse cut down under him, and was himself so severely wounded that his life was despaired of.—Several Blacks had been shot down, and great excitement and confusion prevailed.

“The outbreak was said to be occasioned by an order for taking the Census of the Island, the Blacks believing that it was with a view of making them pay for the Lands they had taken up and cultivated since they had been free.

“Capt. McLeod states that he would have been detained for 15 days had he not fortunately procured his clearance just previous to the outbreak.”
