A Little Preacher.

The following interesting incident is a beautiful illustration of the language of the Psalmist as quoted by the Saviour:

"And what did she tell you of Jesus Christ my child?" he asked.

"Why, she said she came down from heaven and died for poor me; and in a moment the tears gushed from eyes which had looked upon the beauties of only seven summers,

"The proud heart of the skeptic was touched. What the eloquent plea of the minister could not accomplish, the tender sentence of his child had done,

"That evening found him at the praying circle, where, with brokenness of spirit, he asked the prayers of God's people.

"The minister, on returning from this meeting, took his sermon and read it over carefully, and said to his family and to himself: 'There is not enough of Jesus Christ in this discourse.'

"With this view of their relative position before us, we shall be the better able to definitely calculate the value of the sexes to each other.
