Pismark and many members of the federal council were present in the reichstag Tuesday. The president read the address in reply to the speech from the throne. It cordially approves the Emperor's declarations, thank him for his unselfish devotion to the common weal, expresses confidence that under him and the federal government's policy that the firmly united German people will not be disturbed. The address was adopted unanimously.

A despatch from El Paso, Texas, says information has been received there from the flooded district in Mexico, that 1,500 lives were lost and a thousand bodies recovered. The collector of customs at Paso del Norte has received an official despatch stating that 100 miles of the Mexican Central railway is impassable and that it will be ten days before the mails can be got through and twenty before freight can be moved.

While a service was being held in the church at Brezegie, Galicia, Sunday, the building was struck by lightning and almost entirely destroyed. Three persons were killed and 100 injured.
