BLESSINGS AND INCIDENTAL BLESSINGS.

There are two distinct blessings in Salvation, viz. regeneration, and entire sanctification, and after that, numberless blessings. To distinguish them, we will use the term incidental blessings. Perhaps these are the blessings that some people refer to, when they say: "I have had hundreds of blessing," but these hundred blessing people, usually deny the possibility of being kept from sin, so, it may be that they mean, that they have been pardoned, and found peace with God a hundred times; if so, those are not the blessings that we mean by incidental blessings, which come to us as refilling, regirding reassuring, and other manifestations of the Holy Spirit so frequently experienced by wholly sanctified people in conventions, camp meetings and in prayer, testimony, preaching meetings and in private. When faith reaches out and adds new territory to the land already possessed. These blessings are not as some suppose them to be, simply a momentary stirring of the emotions. Although it has this appearance, as the emotional faculties are employed to express the joy, and glory within, but every effort falls short of expressing his real feelings.

The church generally is afraid of these expressions of joy, hence they go to the other extreme, and become extremely cold, but the genuine blessings of God, will be tempered by the Holy Spirit to the glory of God. It is only when people endeavor to have the outward manifestation without the inward blessing, that they run off the track into fanaticism. We do not control these blessings, God bestows them as he wills, and when we need them most. No two are exactly alike, as the circumstances under which we are placed differ. So these incidental blessings are given, they are frequently bestowed in our regular work as reminders of our heavenly father's approval. The best way to seek them is to be true to God at every point. "Do with your might what your hand finds to do," and you will find these blessings awaiting you in the path as you follow the will of your Lord, and Master.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON MAY 21.

Jesus before Pilate: John 18:28-40.

After the prayer contained in the 17th chapter, Jesus with some of his disciples went to Gethesemane. Here Jesus underwent great agony and soon after midnight was betrayed and arrested, being taken before the Jewish authorities by whom he was condemned. He was then taken before Pilate who sent him to Herod, King of Galilee, who was in Jerusalem at that time, Herod in turn sends him again before Pilate. We need to study the account given by other writers. In the account in the preceding verses we have the sad fact of Peter's denial. We need to study well to know ourselves and learn ever to look to God and never rely on ourselves.

The Jews, determined to convict Jesus, led him from their own courts to the Roman judgment hall. By their traditions they were forbidden to enter any gentile house where there might be leaven during the feast of the passover. They were zealous for a form of religion while they had murder in their hearts. Our religion ought to regulate our hearts. When Pilate asked for their accusation they did not want him to investigate the cause, but simply to rely on their sincerity. Envy, jealousy, etc., lead many to do rash and cruel things that would not bear cool investigation. We find in this lesson the prophetic spirit of Jesus confirmed. The Jews could stone to death but they sought the Roman execution which was in this case crucifixion.

We have in this lesson an illustration of weak manhood on the part of Pilate and that of strong, patient and submissive manhood on the part of Jesus. It is a sad thing to find a man of good convictions who does not have manhood enough to carry them out.

Jesus announces his kingdom to be spiritual and its conquests to be spiritual and not with carnal weapons. Jesus affirmed his kingship. His ministry was truth, his requirements were love of the truth.

Pilate asked the question that ought to concern all men and has concerned the greatest minds.

Error never is truth. A man may believe a lie and be sincere but that will never make it a truth. If men had been sincere in search of truth Unitarianism, Universalism, Christian Science, (so called) etc., would never have gained a footing.

Pilate had the spirit of compromise and against his own convictions gave place to the crowd.

The spirit of compromise is doing the same thing today. The base choice of the Jews is Barabbas. Many today are choosing everything else rather than for Jesus to establish his claims in their hearts. What is our choice today? When the multitudes choose whom will we choose. We are given many opportunities of choice.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON MAY 28.

"The Crucifixion" John 19:17-30. We need to study well the closing events in the trial. Pilate's effort to release him; after a warning from his wife, Judas suicided. We need to study those in the other gospels. We have seen Jesus condemned, mocked and cruelly treated by the soldiers, who platted a crown of thorns and pressed it upon his brow. Yet he bears it all in meekness. Oh how this picture ought to put us on our faces when so many times we have failed rather than suffer with him.

Jesus went forth bearing his cross. Another account says he fainted under the load, for the scourging and torture had exhausted him physically. "They

crucified Him," all that is cruel and horrible is embraced in these words, and yet it was for us that he bore it. The crucifixion, the saddest day in the world's history gave way to the most glorious morn. Our greatest blessings spiritual are only possible as we are crucified with him.

Pilate announced one of the most solemn laws of life. "What I have written, I have written." What will our final record be? Jesus recognized his mother in his awful suffering and provided a home for her with John. We are in harmony with the spirit of Jesus when we endeavour in a right sense to provide for those who in themselves could be dependent. What agonies must have wrung Mary's heart as she remembered his life and her hopes since the wise men visited him, but now she sees him crucified between two thieves. His humanity was evidenced on the cross by his thirst.

"It is finished" is the great cry of conquest from the cross. He came, that; "He might redeem us from all iniquity and purify unto himself a peculiar people zealous of good works." He completed the plan and became unto us, wisdom righteousness, sanctification and redemption.

"He gave up the ghost" he did as he had before said. "I have power to lay it down. I have power to take it up again." His death was voluntary for us. Our service must be a voluntary one for him.
