There are very few churches but what the Devil has in them more or less uttering his hallelujahs, and if he can get one who is known as a deeply pious brother or sister to once in a long while open their lips for him, he is exceedingly gratified. Beloved, who are you saying hallelujah for?

"WHEREAS . . ARE YE NOT CARNAL?"

A man can not legitimately do business on capital which he does not possess, neither can he claim ownership of property that has passed out of his hands; if he attempts it he will surely be found out and brought to shame. So it is in spiritual experience— we can't do business upon what we do not possess, neither upon an experience we once had but have lost; our false position will sooner or later be revealed if we attempt it. The proof of the false position will be in its acts. Paul understood this thoroughly when he wrote, "Whereas there is among you envying, and strife, and division, are ye not carnal?" He meant to say to the Corinthians: "You may make all the professions of holiness you like, but while there are envyings and strife and divisions among you, you are yet carnal and act like the world." Where there is an explosion there is proof that there were explosives; and you may try to explain away that fact by saying there was nothing to explode, but there was an explosion. When an explosion occurs it often does deadly work-business is interfered with, men are injured and sometimes lose their lives. When a carnal explosion takes place in a holiness professor or church, God's work is hindered, men backslide and maybe souls are lost forever.—Selected.
