THE TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL ALLIANCE.

Brother Joseph Bullock and Sister Bullock, and Brother J. F. and Mrs. Bullock, were invited to be guests of the Alliance during the Camp Meetings at Beulah and Riverside.

Resolved, that the Executive Committee have charge of Beulah Camp Grounds, buildings, etc., during the whole of the year, and

that Bro. J. F. Bullock be requested to act as advisory superintendent of the water, sewerage and grounds in connection with the executive.

Resolved, that we request Bro. Joseph Bullock to act as financial adviser with the Executive.

At eight o'clock p. m. a laymen's meeting was held in the Tabernacle, led by Brother A. E. Whelpley, and at the same hour the Ministers' Association held a meeting. The following officers were elected: President, Rev. A. H. Trafton; secretary, Rev. S. H. Clarke.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL REFORM.

Paul exhorted Timothy to keep himself pure. Our Lord spoke of the time in which he lived on earth as an adulterous generation. After the elapse of 1900 years as bad or a worse condition obtains. In some respects social evils are simply appalling. The wealthy and poor alike, in many instances, are in the grip of this immoral monster, which destroys and degrades the homes of the millionaire as well as of the poor. Divorces even among those who are holding high positions are not uncommon, and scandals of the lowest character are of almost daily occurrence. The white slave traffic is quite universal. Statistics are frequently given which show that vast sums of money, overtopping even the enormous sums used in the liquor and tobacco evils are expended in this crime of crimes. Houses furnished with all the appliances requisite to this awful traffic are put up at the midnight auction and sold to the highest bidder weekly, or monthly, and other features of this hellish traffic have been brought to light through the police graft investigation in New York.

Not only is this dreadful skeleton looking the nations in the face, but all its machinery is in full operation in almost every nation under the sun. A branch of this evil is the licensed brothel, known as the red light district in many cities, and from these are shaded down in varying colors to the social evils of every degree found in the community, village, town and city, with those things which suggest and contribute to these conditions.

We, as a people, deplore the present social conditions with all which contributes to them, viz: suggestive literature, the theatre, the dance, much which is shown in the "moving picture theatres," immodest dress. The intermingling of men and women attired in their bathing suits at public resorts, with all things that corrupt the people's minds and morals. And we are ready to co-operate by all right means employed by the large denominations of Christians against all social evils.

And where persons are proven to be traffickers in the white slave trade that the severest punishment should be administered to them, and we believe that anything condemned by God should never be licensed by men.
