



Ambrose H. Sherwood, the first editor of The Highway, was born in Lakefield, N. B., in 1860, of godly Baptist parentage. He began teaching at the age of eighteen, which profession, except for intervals of study, he has followed ever since.

In 1883, while a student at the Boston School of Oratory, he was led, under the preaching of Dr. A. B. Earle, a pioneer in the ranks of the Holiness movement, to surrender to the Lord Jesus Christ, and united with the Tremont Temple Church. In that year also




REV. S. A. BAKER.

he was married to Lavinia Robertson, a Nova Scotian teacher then in Boston working her way toward a better education. She had been clearly and blessedly converted at the age of eighteen, and the two began their married life with a family altar, which has been a stay and a refuge for them in all the intervening years. God has graciously been with them and has blessed them with six children, of whom five are living, and all claiming Jesus as their personal Saviour.

Shortly after their marriage, Brother and Sister Sherwood returned to New Brunswick, where they lived for nine years. Of this time Brother Sherwood taught four years at St. Martins, two at North Head and two at Hampton. In 1889, having moved to North Head, Grand Manan, our brother and sister came in touch with the doctrine of the second work of grace, just beginning to be spread abroad through the province. Cautiously they approached it with much prayer, lest by any

means they should be led into error, and with study of the Word, to learn if these things were indeed true. The Holy Spirit soon showed them that it was their blessed privilege to be cleansed from all unrighteousness, and they joyfully accepted Jesus as their Sanctifier and were received into the North Head church by Brother H. H. Cosman, then pastor.

The following year, when it appeared to the brethren necessary that a paper be published in the interest of the Holiness work in New Brunswick, Brother and Sister Sherwood were selected as the editors of the prospective sheet, with permission to choose the name and
