


## THE LATE REV. WILLIAM KINGHORN.

A sketch of his life, by the late Rev. G. W. MacDonald. Written for the "King's Highway" and published January 15th, 1895.


The late Wm. Kinghorn was born in England in 1823 and was in the best sense of the word an Englishman. His straightforward, honest manner, his quaint humorous expressions, his plain blunt manner in conversation, coupled with his rich native dialect plainly indicated his English extraction. His early home was in Cumberland County, England, where he was converted at the early age of twelve years.

He was baptized July 27, 1842, and was ordained as a preacher of the Gospel in January, 1848. Previous to his ordination he had been preaching five years as a licensed preacher, supporting himself and labouring unceasingly in the midst of multiplied difficulties and persecutions, as is stated in his letter of recommendation which he bore from his church, in which it is said he carried with him to America the prayers and good will of his brethren among whom he had lived and laboured.

On coming to New Brunswick he became a member of the Free Christian Baptist
