The funeral services took place at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. E. O. Cosman, 958 Twenty-fourth avenue, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. G. L. Wilson having charge. Interment was made at Lakewood cemetery.

At her residence at Central Kingsclear, on Feb. 9th, after a few days' sickness with la grippe, Sister Knight, wife of Deacon D. F. Sister Knight was converted about fifty years ago at Fredericton, and was baptized by the late Rev. Ezekiel McLeod, and united with the F. C. B. Church. About a year ago she joined the Reformed Baptist Church at Fredericton, of which Brother Knight is Senior Deacon. Sister Knight lived a good Christian life, gentle, kind and benevolent, and her last words were expressions of unwavering faith. She said:

Sister Knight having reached the ripe age of 88 years, was most tenderly cared for by her husband, and daughter, Mrs. Joseph McKay, for the past five years, Mrs. McKay taking the full care of the home. The funeral service was conducted in the United Baptist church at Kingsclear, by Rev. S. A. Baker, assisted by Rev. Mr. Colpitts, United Baptist, and Rev. M. Flemmington, Methodist.
