THE SLANDERER.

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The above words give the exact meaning of the Greek word, diabolos, which in the English bible is translated, devil. The fact throws very dark reflection upon the characters of men and women who misrepresent the truth, for it shows that they are walking directly in the pathway of the devil, whose true character is made plainer to us as we consider him in the light of the above definition. He is the great slanderer of the universe. It is his business to misrepresent God, his truth, and his people. In order to do this successfully he must misrepresent himself. Thus he represents God as a liar, his truth as a lie and his people as those who walk in error or deceitfulness, while he comes himself as an angel of light to the hearts of men, pretends to be interested in their welfare, deceives many, and ruins their careers for time and eternity.

His earthly career of deception began in the garden of Eden, when he made the progenitors of our race believe that God had deceived them and was keeping from them something which they might enjoy with profit.

Thus he led them to take the fatal step which brought death upon them and their seed forever. And press the battle ere the night

Shall veil the glowing skies.

There is indeed great need of a spiritual awakening which will reveal to the church its great need of a better way. Rev. H. C. Archer has received a call to remain pastor of the Woodstock church for another year.


