Dear Highway,—We are reminded of the fleetness of time as we catch a few moments to report the Lord's dealings with His people in this part of His field. Months have slipped by and the old year, with all its opportunities, embraced or neglected, has gone from us forever. We are glad to report victory in our soul and victory in our work, both spiritual and temporal. Surely the hand of our Lord has dealt graciously with us in the past year, keeping from our ranks to a great extent sickness, and marvelously bringing about the restoration of some and not permitting death to claim any of our flock; for all of which we praise Him. Again, we have seen souls born into the kingdom and the saints made to rejoice. On Dec. 11th, 1913, the Fourth District Quarterly Meeting met with this church, and we were assisted by Brother Henderson, of Grand Manan, and all enjoyed his visit very much. He was indeed filled with the Spirit, and preached the Word with the unction of the Holy One. His preaching was much appreciated by all who had the privilege of hearing him, and God blessed the Word to the good of precious souls.

It has been my privilege since Alliance, through the kindness of the churches on my circuit, to visit the church at Phinney's Cove, which privilege I enjoyed very much, finding a very kind and generous people. It was the first time they had been visited in nine years by one of their own, and over a year since a service of any kind had been held in that place. Truly, they have been a neglected people. Yet many hearts still beat loyally to our denomination, and we believe God has a work for us to do in that place. I also visited New Tusket, with the Quarterly Meeting in September, and again on 30th of November, finding them still keeping the fire burning and the light shining and God is indeed blessing them in their efforts.

Since Alliance it has been our experience to change our place of residence twice. And now we are very comfortably and pleasantly located

in Port Maitland, and receiving the kindest attention from all.
