## THE KING'S HIGHWAY.



MRS. REV. H. C. SANDERS AND FAMILY.

The above picture was made from a snapshot photo taken at our South Africa Mission Station the last of November by Dr. Sanders. Sister Sanders gives the following description of the picture:

Faith, Paul, Lydia and Fitini or Johan were ready to go and visit a sick girl some eight or more miles from here. The flowers are all on one stalk, and a lily that blooms once a season, but such a beauty. Often 20 or 26 blooms and buds on one stalk. They are large, white with pink ribs, and of very sweet perfume. We call them Intombi Lily, because found on the bank of a small river on the edge of the farm. The tall trees in the background are pampan trees, a tropical variety with fine fruit. If you look sharp you will see low down beneath this tree on one side of the picture some banana plants also. We have these planted on the eastern side of the house so as to shelter from frost. Beyond the picture, on the right side, are apricot and peach trees. Paul, Faith and George are mounted. Judson looks down because of strong light. You can see the head of the old donkey, but the other two are hidden. You can see that Miriam (sitting) has grown a lot, and Grace also; Charley is a big boy, and baby Norman of good size, just six months old. I am sorry Dr. Sanders is not in the picture—he snapped it.
