Peter and John prayed for the disciples at Samaria and they received the Holy Ghost.

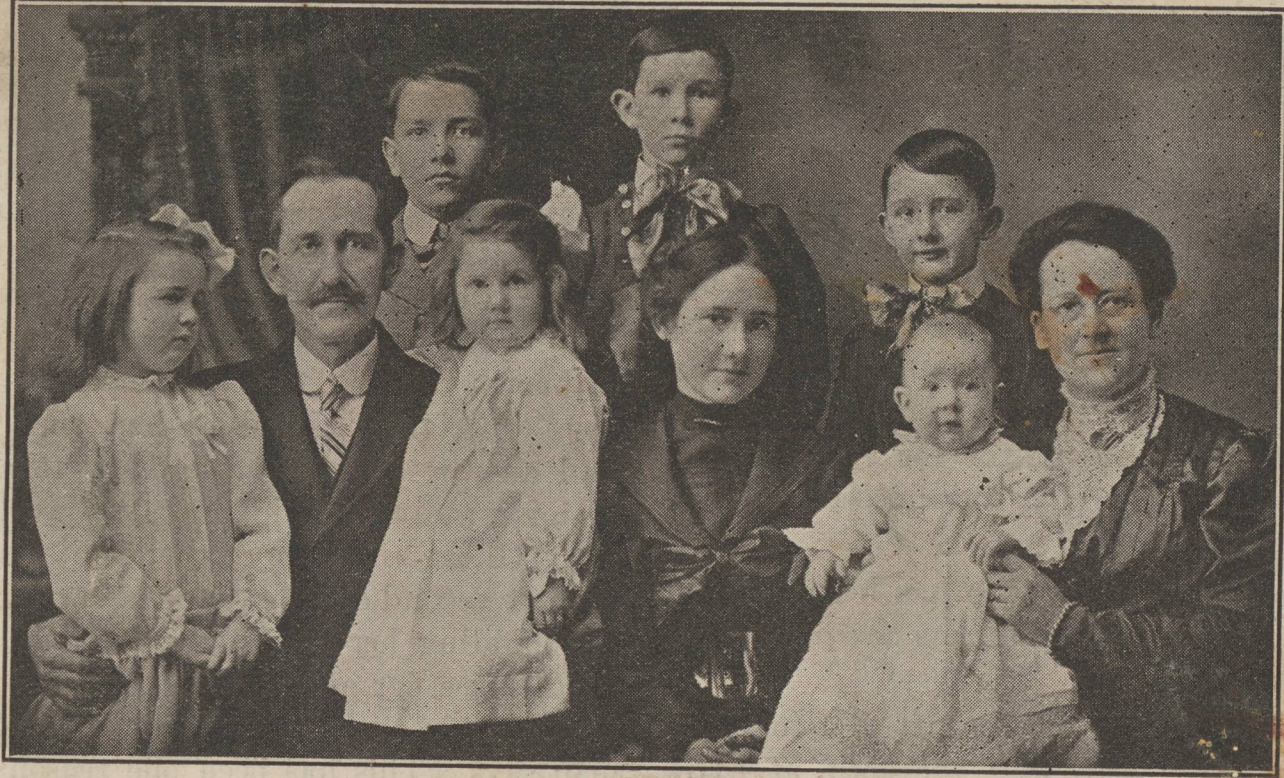
Cornelius prayed and met an angel who instructed him what to do.
