Question—Will you give a synopsis of the indications, causes and results of fanaticism in its various forms?

Answer—This would be well nigh impossible in so little space and limited time. Indeed it is such a diverse and many hued coil that we would almost despair of the task under any circumstances. But we will note a few general points. As to indications, a tendency to separate from and distrust other good people upon the assumption that they are bound by traditions and not out in the light. With this a disposition to judge the whole Church as wrong. A disposition to give too much credence to impressions. Unnatural neglect of physical laws or a morbid conscience over the matter of eating, sleeping and other bodily functions. Preference for visions, dreams, and other unusual phenomena over teaching, preaching and ordinary means of grace. Unnatural tones of voice in praying and speaking. Elevating their own revelations over God's written word. A supplanting of natural affections by those we think are in the Spirit, etc.

As to causes. Satanic temptation. Running after new things. Loss of humility. Neglect of advice. Passion for something sensational. Association with people who have zeal without knowledge. Lack of temperance in the matter of their sensible enjoyment of religion, etc.

Results — Loss of influence. Loss of reason. Loss of standing among people that they need to be a help to them. Often loss of family relations. Frequently, loss of virtue. Sometimes loss of faith utterly. And in some instances loss of soul.

Question — How can one feel grieved by an unkindness, and not be angry?"

Answer — The grief is the hurt we feel. Anger would want the other to feel the hurt back.—Heart and Life Bulletin.
