The funeral of the late Rev. J. F. Estey, pastor of the Methodist Church, Keswick, who died on Friday, Aug. 20th, of apoplexy, took place Sunday, Aug. 22, and was very largely attended. A private service was held at his late residence at 1.30 p. m., and a public service held at Smith's Corner Methodist church. This service was addressed by Rev. Mr. Marshall of Fredericton; Rev. Mr. Estey was in the 66th year of his age, and in the forty-first of his ministry, having held many important charges in New Brunswick and P. E. Island conferences.

Rev. Mr. Estey received his early education in Jacksonville, Carleton County, and afterwards attended both the Academy and University at Mount Allison, Sackville.

T. A. BLACKADAR, B. A.

Rev. T. A. Blackadar, B. A., one of the oldest and most respected Baptist ministers in these provinces, died at Great Village, Colchester County, N. S., on the night of the 24th. Mr. Blackadar was born in Hebron, N. S. He was graduated from Acadia College in 1865 and was ordained the same year. He held several pastorates both in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
