Linus was a very bright and sweet dispositioned child, and loved by all. The funeral services were held Tuesday at the home and in the R. B. church at Hartland at 2.30 p.m., the writer officiating, assisted by Rev. Geo. Kincaid, U. B., and Rev. P. J. Quigg, P. B. Appropriate music was rendered by the choir.
