SERMON BY BROTHER FRED FOSTER.

Tuesday afternoon, August 10th, 1915. From Ex., 10-26—"There shall not an hoof be left behind."

Moses had demanded of Pharaoh that he let the people of Israel go to serve God, but Pharaoh refused again and again; and God through Moses sent plague after plague upon the Egyptians, until they pleaded with the Israelites to leave Egypt. The text refers to the answer that Moses gave to Pharaoh when he said that the people could go, but to leave their flocks and herds behind. Moses replied: "Not an hoof shall be left behind." This is a representation of our entire consecration, when we come to God to be sanctified wholly—we must put all on the altar. Pharaoh represents the devil who opposes us. It required courage for Moses to make such a demand. It requires courage in us to give up all. But let us look into Moses' life. He had a Godly and courageous mother. It is a grand thing to have Godly parents. It required faith—see Abraham as an example of faith-going out from home, kindred and friends, trusting in God alone. We must have such a faith to be sanctified. But the devil tries to get us to compromise. He says "Stay in the land; don't leave the worldly company."

"Not an hoof must be left behind." Then, secondly, he says, "Don't go very far." So many fail because they only go half way. But "Not an hoof must be left behind." Paul did not fool with such people, but with twelve men that had the Holy Ghost he had a great revival in Ephesus. Then darkness came, but Pharaoh backed out. Then God sent the death angel and he let them go. It will cost you ALL to be sanctified—"every hoof." But beware, the devil will be after you to bring you back.
