Editorial.

BEULAH CAMP MEETING.

Notwithstanding the general depression of the people's feelings, and the financial stringency, Beulah Camp Meeting was declared by many to be one of the very best and most successful meetings ever held on the Beulah Camp Ground. The attendance was fully up to, if not larger than any previous year. While we missed a large number of those who usually attend, there were many others present for the first time. Every person was delighted with the beauty of the place, but this did not detract from the services, as the attendance was excellent and a growing interest was manifested in every meeting. Brother Smith's preaching and teaching was of such an excellent order that it attracted and held the closest attention of all. We will not attempt to describe his method of preaching further than to say that his sermons were heart messages, given in the simplest and choicest language, and perfectly free from all suspicion of the least desire to attract praise or undue admiration of his knowledge or gifts; in other words, he kept the man and his gifts well back of the message.

His manner of preaching was calm, deliberate, clear, strong, deeply impressive, convincing and attractive to every thoughtful person, but not overly demonstrative. In regard to his lack of physical demonstration, so much in evidence with many holiness evangelists as well as with "Billy" Sunday, he told a good little story on himself. During one of his meetings he was entertained at a home where they had a little boy, with whom he became very friendly, and the little fellow's mother took him to one of the services, and after returning home she asked him how he liked Mr. Smith. The little fellow replied, "Oh, I like him all right, but he is no holiness preacher." His mother said, "Why do you say that?" "Oh, well, he is no holiness preacher, just the same." "Why don't you think he is a holiness preacher?" He replied, "Why, he can't jump worth a cent!"

Although Brother Smith did no jumping, hundreds of people joined in requesting him to be the evangelist for Beulah Camp Meeting in 1916. Brother Smith noticed the excellent or-

der on Sundays, and the attendance at the services by about all the people on the grounds, and spoke of it in the closing service. He said: "I have been attending camp meetings as an evangelist for twenty-nine years, and I know I am well within the number I have attended when I put it at 300 camp meetings; and it is due to you people for me to say that I have never attended one that had such excellent order and general attention to the services on Sundays as you have had here. It is more like a church service than a camp meeting."

Another of Brother Smith's striking declarations we wish to note is the following:

"While this is only my second visit to Canada, I am somewhat acquainted with your statistics, and I noted that in Canada, in the crime of murder you have only 25 murders where in the United States there are 125 for the same number of people. I attribute this great difference in the proportion of crimes to the fact that the Canadian preachers, to a large extent, continue to preach the old Bible doctrine of eternal punishment."

In the grand success of Beulah Camp Meeting in attendance and spiritually as well as financially, we are fully confirmed in the fact that real Christian work is not dependent upon favorable earthly conditions for its success, and we will find this verified also at the Riverside Camp Meeting. If we make it the subject of earnest united prayer, God can and will give us the greatest and most successful camp meeting ever held on Riverside Camp Ground, in spite of the financial conditions that now prevail in that great farming country. Let our faith be in God, not in commercial conditions.
