She was cared for by her family and family physician, all of whom did all in their power to relieve and restore her. As her husband stood over her weeping, she smilingly said, "Don't weep for me, I'm only going home." Truly she will be missed by the little holiness church at Lower Southampton, by her family and especially by her husband, and by the whole neighborhood, for she was everybody's friend. The funeral took place on Friday, 10th inst., and was attended by a large gathering of people, which showed she was beloved by all. The occasion was improved by the writer from 2 Cor. v 1, a text selected by the deceased, who also selected the hymns, which were beautifully sung by the United Baptist choir.
