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REPORT OF QUARTERLY MEETING.

The quarterly meeting of District No. 1 convened with the church at Lower Hainesville on Thursday evening, May 27, 1915.

Officers elected for the ensuing quarter — Pres., E. W. Lester; Sec., H. C. Mullen; Treas., Arthur Chute; Highway Agent, H. C. Archer.

The following devotional committee was appointed by the chair: Bros. B. R. Burtt, Henry Hoyt and Arthur Chute, to act with the Pastor, Rev. E. W. Lester.

On motion Bro. Perley Briggs was invited to a seat in the Q. M. Words of appreciation and good will were extended to Bro. Briggs by Bro. Lester and other ministers, to which Bro. Briggs feelingly replied. Reports of the churches were then listened to.

Woodstock reports: — During the quarter the Lord has been graciously helping us in the work. The pastor has been helped to preach the word with fervor and power and much conviction is on the people. The prayer meetings are always inspiring and manifesting a progressive spirit. We have just conducted two weeks special services ably assisted by Rev. P. J. Trafton. A number were converted and sanctified.

The remaining services were as follows: Saturday evening, preaching by Rev. H. C. Mullen, subject—"The Christians Altar." In this meeting a number rose for prayers and one young woman sought and definitely found the experience of a clean heart. Sunday, 9 a. m., love feast, led by Bro. Briggs. A season of great blessing. Theme, "The rest that remains for the people of God." 10.30, preaching by Rev. Henry Smith from Eph. X:13. At 2.30 p. m., Rev. J. H. Coy brought the message from Matt. 23:37. An excellent and appropriate discourse. The following are a few striking quotations: "It is very possible for people of this day to kill the prophets sent unto them. We kill the prophets when we criticize them before our children; when we fail to support the preacher; can kill the prophet quite successfully by staying home from the preaching service and the prayer meeting. In these ways you can kill the best prophet ever sent unto you."

Sunday evening Rev. H. C. Archer preached to a very attentive and appreciative audience from Isa 52:3. To quote the good things from this sermon would mean the same as writing it in full. The ideas of bondage to the devil and deliverance through Christ was the theme. In this service one young woman sought full salvation, while a large number rose for prayers. From Saturday night onward the house was packed to its utmost capacity, many on Sunday not finding entrance. The services

were all characterized by deep interest on the part of the hearers and the very conscious presence of the Holy Spirit. Someone was definitely blessed in every service. The brethren all preached remarkably well, and the quarterly meeting was a time of victory and blessing throughout.
