Our aged sister, Mrs. Mary Miller of Hartland, N. B., passed away peacefully on Sunday night, the 12th inst. It seemed a very fitting time for the dear old Saint to be called home at the close of the Sabbath day which she had observed so sacredly. Her long life covering almost fourteen years of Sabbaths in her 95 years. Sister Miller was born in St. John, N. B., March 4th, 1821 and was a member of the Brussels Street Baptist Church. Early in the holiness movement Sister Miller embraced the great blessing of perfect love and became a charter member of the Reformed Baptist denomination and always bore steady and beautiful testimony to the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit in her heart and life. She was patient, kind, gentle, thoughtful, in her disposition and up to a few years ago employed her spare time in reading the best religious literature and found much enjoyment in talking of the wondrous grace of God. Withal, Sister Miller was a woman of an unusually strong and intelligent personality with a great mother love, deeply devoted to her only surviving son, Mr. Samuel Miller, (of the Esty & Curtis Drug Co., of Hartland.)

He was loyally devoted to the cause of holiness and contributed to the work, and especially to equipment of the Beulah Camp Ground Hotel with the gifts of several quilts, the work of her own hands after she had passed her eightieth year of age. The pastors of the Hartland church even after they had taken other charges received gifts made with her own hands. She found much happiness and contentment in devoting her time to useful work. Sister Miller taught school in many places in the Province after the death of her husband.

The funeral service was conducted at the residence of her son on the 14th by the Rev. S. A. Baker, assisted by Rev. H. S. Dow of Woodstock and Rev. Mr. Franchette (Episcopal) and Rev. George Kincade, United Baptist. Interment was made in the Hartland cemetery.
