OBITUARY

He is survived by a widow, his second wife, whom he married a few years ago in Woodstock, and two sons, councillor George Sanders of Port Maitland, N.S., and Rev. H. C. Sanders M.D. of Paulpietersburg, South Africa. They leave twelve grand-children and two great-grand-children. The late Mrs. Sanders was born May 7th 1864 and died in Aug. 1908, aged 62 years.

Brother Sanders was born Oct. 5th 1837. They were married April 12th, 1863 by Rev. Aaron Cogswell.
