ald, S. A. Baker, M. S. Trafton and Bros. B. N. Goodspeed and A. L. Bubar. Bro. McDonald became Editor once more and Bro. Baker, Business Manager. But as Bro. Baker was in St. John and the "Highway" was printed in Woodstock, he obtained the assistance of Bro. Harry G. Noble of Woodstock to act for him until the Alliance of June, 1901. The above committee continued to act for 1901 and 1902, except that Rev. H. C. Archer was appointed Business Manager. In December, 1902, the Editor, Bro. McDonald, departed this life, when Bros. Baker and Wiggins assumed joint control of the editorship until the Alliance of July, 1903. Bro. S. A. Baker was then appointed Editor, with Revds. M. S. Trafton and A. L. Bubar and Bro. B. N. Goodspeed as Associate Editors and Rev. H. C. Archer as Business Manager.

At the next Alliance in July, 1904, Bro. Baker was appointed both Editor and Business Manager, and Revds. H. C. Archer, M. S. Trafton, A. L. Bubar, G. B. McDonald and W. B. Wiggins, with Bro. B. N. Goodspeed as Associate Editors. This arrangement continued until the Alliance of June, 1909, when Rev. J. H. Coy was substituted for Bro. Bubar. These continued in office until the Alliance of June, 1910, when Rev. H. C. Archer was chosen Editor and Business Manager, with Revds. S. A. Baker, W. B. Wiggins, M. S. Trafton, J. H. Coy and M. S. Blaisdell and B. N. Goodspeed as Associates. This arrangement continued until the Alliance of July, 1912., when Bro. Wiggins resigned and Rev. L. T. Sabine was elected in his place. Bro. Archer also resigned, but agreed to act as Business Manager till September 30th of this year, when Bro. Baker became both Editor and Business Manager again. But as he was pastor of Fredericton Church, the office of publication was changed from Woodstock to "The Gleaner" office in Fredericton, where it is now printed, Bro. Baker being Editor and Business Manager, and Revds W. B. Wiggins, H. C. Archer, P. J. Trafton, and Bro. B. N. Goodspeed, Associates. Thus, "The Highway" has had a remarkable career, having existed for nearly 26 years and has paid its way free from all paid advertisements of any kind—a most remarkable history in connection with Religious Newspapers. The reason is evident. It was established by prayer and faith in God, and promulgates the Bible doctrine and experience of HOLINESS.

Bro. B. N. Goodspeed is the only member of the original committee who has been continuously on its staff and though now in his 81st year of age, has reasonably good health and frequently writes for its pages. Bro. Baker has had quite a long term as Editor and Business Manager, filling these offices for about 12 years. "The Highway" under his management has prospered and become a success. Its circulation is increasing and we are looking forward to the time when it will visit us as a weekly instead of semi-monthly, and when its circulation will be doubled.
