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used simply in spectacular show. It requires fire to produce power and the power keeps the machinery in motion. The right kind of fire will keep us in motion in keeping the work of the church of Christ in motion.

Yes, we need fire, for we need light, warmth and power.

NOT IN THE WISDOM OF MAN, BUT IN THE POWER OF GOD.

The great Apostle reveals a vital truth in his declaration of the purpose and manner of his preaching to the Corinthian Church, in which he relegates to a scrap heap all those things included in the wisdom of men which are dangerous and fatal substitutes for the power of God in the salvation of men. Showing that there is an indispensable need of the real supernatural divine power to be exerted in man to change him from his natural state of darkness, bondage, and sin, to a Son of God; to "translate him from the kingdom of darkness to the kingdom of God's dear son." And man's faith should ever after exert, seek, and receive all spiritual light, life and daily food by the operation of the power of God, and that every opinion of man should be put under the X-ray of light of the Word of God, and the Holy Spirit, and where there is any conflict between the wisdom of man and the super-natural manifestation, or operation of power of God, as the sin-destroying, life-giving, love-producing, temptation resisting, courage imparting, heart cleansing assurance of salvation from sin. Our faith will stand unshaken in the power of God, to do for us "exceeding abundantly above all we ask or think."

The apostle said, "And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power."

"My preaching was not with persuasive doctrines of human wisdom, I used none of the means of which great orators avail themselves, whereby to become popular and thereby to gain fame."
