There is no intimation in the Bible that God so preserves and protects His spiritual children that they will not be the subjects of affliction. God always has shown a peculiar regard for true believers everywhere. He loves them as He loves no other class of people; but this fact does not bind God to use miraculous power to prevent Christians from being afflicted, and, in many cases, greatly afflicted. The late C. H. Spurgeon represents an afflicted person as saying, "Surely, if I were a child of God, this would not happen." Then he adds these words: "Oh! say not so. The best of God's saints must drink the wormwood; the dearest of His children must bear the cross. Perhaps the Lord allotted to you, at first, a smooth and unclouded path, because you were weak and timid; but now that you are stronger in the spiritual life, you must enter upon the riper and rougher experience of God's full-grown children. We need winds and tempests to exercise our faith, to tear off the rotten boughs of self-dependence and to root us more firmly in Christ. The day of evil reveals to us the value of our glorious hope. My sorely afflicted readers ought to receive a great deal of comfort from those wise words. I doubt not that you are frequently strongly tempted to think that if God really loved you as much as the Bible says that He does, He would not permit you to be afflicted as greatly and constantly as you are, and have been. But do remember the truth that God never ceases to love you, and the more afflicted you are the more abundantly does God give you the needed grace and comfort.
