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EDITORIAL.

THE HARVEST TRULY PLENTIFUL.

When Jesus, our blessed Lord, beheld the fainting and scattered people he saw the pitiful picture of a flock of sheep without a shepherd broken up and wearied, so they were tired and lay down. Knowing their condition and real need of the true bread of life and to be gathered up and cared for. His great heart was stirred with compassion and called the attention of his disciples to them, saying, "The harvest is truly plenteous, but the laborers are few." In this is the revelation of the true and divinely called and commissioned labourer, and the great work that is laid out before him.

We frequently hear men whose appearance is so stiff and emotionless that it suggests to one that they had been cast in a mold all dresed, and their hair parted in the middle and glued down, talking about "the vision of Jesus" and we wonder what they mean; for we know that any man that saw men as Jesus did, and felt for them as Jesus felt, could not possibly be as stiff and cold and unmoved as these dear men are, who are so afraid of any semblance of religious excitement. If we see men as Jesus saw them, we will have the true vision of Jesus, and the clearer our vision the deeper we will be stirred, and the clearer we will see the nature and the magnitude of the labour we are called to perform. Oh, for men, many of them, who can see the spiritual weariness and faintness of the people who are tired of fruitless forms and ceremonies, and wearisome and insipid platitudes, whose hearts are hungering for the real soul saving peace bestowing, love imparting, transforming power that Jesus alone can give. Workers, who themselves are partakers of the fruits, who are regenerated by the power of God, cleansed by the precious blood of Jesus Christ, and full of the Holy Ghost and faith, who have presented their bodies a living sacrifice, holy, and acceptable to God as a reasonable service.

Who will go out to serve and not to be served. True laborers spend more time in the work to which they are called than they do about their home looking after a wife and one child. They can get away from home in the service of Christ as well as a man can get away a month or six months on business, or a soldier can go to war.

To see people as Jesus saw them, to feel for them as Jesus felt for them, loosens the home ties, as it loosened the heaven ties from Jesus. We know wife's reasonings and lonesomeness and tears are strong cords, but the labourer has read the conditions of discipleship, Christ and his cause must be first.

Our young men should hear Paul's charge to Timothy, But watch thou in all things, endure afflictions (of getting out from home) do the work of an evangelist, make full proof of thy ministry, in addition to pastoral duties. Not necessarily to leave the pastoral work. Evangelize the near-by fields. A labourer should work hard enough to get tired. If we want the true power, seek to see men as Jesus did, and seek to feel for them as he felt. Then the labour becomes the spontaneous result of our love for souls, and not from a sense of duty, in which case we will not lack the spirit of prevailing prayer nor travail of soul, and we will have no time to spend in preaching on non-essential themes.

This will not hinder us exercising good judgment in conducting our services.

A good mechanic is always seeking to improve himself in his work, and always sees room for improvement. He learns by experience and observation. Drop mannerisms and methods that work against best results. Avoid the mistakes of others as well as our own. We may get in the habit of saying "Glory be to God," until it becomes meaningless to ourselves and monotonous and painful to the brethren, and ridiculous to the people.

It will do us good to get a good definition of what constitutes the type of labourers the Lord sends into his harvest field to harvest souls for his eternal kingdom, then seek to know if we possess the qualifications to make us successful workmen in spiritual things. "But when Jesus saw the multitudes, he was moved with compassion on them because they fainted—were tired and lay down-and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd. Then saith he unto his disciples, The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers unto his harvest.'
