Neville Nevers.

Laura Seeley.

The announcement of the sudden death of Miss Laura Seeley was a great shock to her friends in this community.

She had a great many friends, especially among the young people. She was with some friends in San Diego, when she was taken suddenly ill with Acute Bright's Disease and passed away on the morning of July 2nd, before her grandparents could get to her.

Laura was born in Jacksonville, New Brunswick, Canada, April 26, 1896. She was converted when six years of age, and since being in Inglewood has been active in the young people's work, and while in San Diego was wonderfully helped in her Christian experience. She was the faithful pianist for the Epworth League of the First Methodist Church of Inglewood, and also acted in the same capacity for the Sunday School for several years.

She graduated from the Inglewood Union High School in 1914. She was always cheerful, and a favorite among the young people in the church and in her circle of acquaintances in the community as well.

Miss Seeley leaves to mourn their loss, a grandfather and grandmother, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Seeley, of Inglewood, a father, a stepmother and two half-sisters, of Westfield, Maine. Her own mother died when she was eight years old.

The funeral was held from the First Methodist Church, Thursday afternoon, July the fifth. There was a large gathering of friends and the services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. Sedweek. The remains were placed in a vault in the Inglewood Cemetery to await the arrival of her father from the East.

The floral offerings were many and beautiful, showing, in a measure, the respect and love for the departed one by her Inglewood friends. Her's was a short but beautiful life, budded on earth to bloom in heaven.

The Christian Brotherhood of the C. G. R. works at Moncton, is one of the best working Christian associations in the Province. 60 or more men spend their noon hour, daily, in the study of the Sunday School lessons and prayer services. Every Wednesday noon one of the city pastors is invited to speak to the men who enter most heartily into the service.
