Clark was the organist through the entire meeting and proved herself with great credit and the people expressed their appreciation in a practical way.

Our special singers, Evangelists Rev. H. S. and Mrs. Mullen were listened to with intense interest and delighted and blessed thousands of people with the glorious gospel in songs. They truly sing for the glory of God and we appreciate them highly. It is refreshing beyond expression of words to hear the gospel sung in the Spirit.

We have the glad news for our people that despite all the things that from the human view point looked unpromising, sufficient money and pledges were raised to free Riverside Camp Ground from debt. Up to the present time we have expended about eight thousand dollars in improvements on Riverside Camp Ground and all the improvements and other expenses are now paid, but other improvements are yet to be made to provide accommodation for the increasing crowds, and the great number of automobiles—it was estimated that as high as eleven hundred cars visited Riverside on both Sundays, besides fully 150 horses and carriages, and it was said by a visiting brother that it was the quietest and most attentive company he had seen at a camp meeting. The hotel and rooms and ground committees managed their departments in a most satisfactory manner, notwithstanding all departments involved much hard work, as well as skill and ability and the committees are deserving of general commendation for their labour and sacrifices. It takes both grace and grit to manage the business end of camp meetings like Beulah and Riverside, especially when all the labour is given gratuitously.

Rev. L. T. Sabine also deserves hearty commendation for the executive ability he manifested in conducting the spiritual part of the camp meeting. It was his first time to have charge of the services, yet he possessed and exercised the qualifications of a really wise and excellent leader. Altogether it was a very successful meeting for which we humbly thank our great heavenly Father.
