The King has appointed Sunday, Jan. 6th, 1918, as "a special day of prayer and thanksgiving" in all the churches throughout the Empire. In the letter setting aside this special day he says: "The world-wide struggle for the triumph of right and liberty is entering upon its last and most difficult phase. The enemy is striving by desperate assault and subtle intrigue to perpetuate the wrongs already committed and to stem the tide of a free civilization. We have yet to complete the great task to which, more than three years ago, we dedicated ourselves. At such a time I would call upon you to devote a special day to prayer, that we may have the clear-sightedness necessary to victory in our cause." We are sure this appointment will meet with favor everywhere throughout the Empire. The vicissitudes of the long-continued and nerve-racking struggle have led men to realize as never before the weakness of our humanity, and the need of divine help in this great struggle for freedom. And now, when the nations are war-weary and well-nigh exhausted. it is well to remember that we need great wisdom and clear-sightedness, that we may not throw away the results of our hardwon victory. We need divine inspiration and divine guidance, and we need also a clear view of some of the things which stand in the way of our victory. The enemy which is more to be feared than Germany is still strong in our national life. While we pray for victory over the German menace, let us pray just as fervently for delivery from the soul-destroying, nationblasting liquor traffic.-Christian Guardian.
