EDITORIAL.

THE 29TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ALLIANCE OF THE REFORMED BAPTIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Our Twenty-ninth Annual Meeting revealed the fact that we had enjoyed one of the most successful years of our history, despite the conditions brought about by the great world war, every department of the work showed a marked increase, in additions to the membership of the churches, and the Sunday Schools were more largely attended, and the amount of money raised for all purposes far exceeded the amount raised in any one year of the past. The work of the Alliance was carried through expeditiously and with beautiful harmony. Brother L. T. Sabine proved himself to be an excellent presiding officer and did his work well.

We have not as yet received Dr. Sanders' annual report of the work in South Africa, but we know it has been a successful year, and we have raised over five thousand dollars for the home and foreign work during the past year. Having succeeded in purchasing and paying for Balmoral Missionary Farm, it has placed the work there on a good basis, and it is the intention of the Missionary Board to give special attention to the development of the home work both among the churches and entering new places with the grand gospel of full salvation that are opening to us. God is surely upholding us, and giving us a place in the hearts of the people. Let us as a people continue to trust God and hold up the standard of holiness unto the Lord, and victory is sure.

BEULAH CAMP MEETING.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Camp Meeting on Beulah Camp Ground was a grand success. All things seemed to combine in working together for the comfort and blessing, both spiritually and temporally, to all who were in a condition to drink in

the surrounding beauty, and the blessings from heaven. Beulah never was more beautiful; we overheard expressions of delight as the people walked through the grounds, amid trees, flowers and fountains, and sat on the river bank. Instead of the surrounding beauty detracting from the spiritual life and success of the services, it added greatly to deepen the sense of the presence of God, and an Anglican clergyman remarked to the writer, "God is surely here."

The services were the grand attraction. When the time arrived for a meeting to be held the people gathered eager to hear the sermons, testimonies and prayers, and to join in songs of praise and worship.

The brethren preached the word with power and unction, with results following in grand altar services, with many seekers, many of whom were finders. Brother W. E. Smith's and Brother Foster's sermons were highly appreciated and enjoyed by all. The singing led by Rev. P. J. Trafton was full of life and blessing.

The special selections sung by Rev. H. S. and Sister Mullen were sweet messengers that carried rich blessing to the hundreds of hearts that will re-echo throughout the year. Brother J. F. Bullock fully sustained his record of many years in his punctuality and faithfulness and skill at the organ, assisted by Miss Josie Cody at the piano, and also by Sister S. H. Clark, who was an every-ready help.

From the point of attendance throughout it was as large if not the largest ever held at Beulah; in fact every place was so crowded toward the last that people could not get accommodations and had to return home.

This reveals to us that more large buildings are needed. A new 50 room dormitory will scarcely supply the need for 1918. With the completion of the St. John Valley R. R. there will be thousands more people attracted to Beulah. A holiness camp meeting which is kept free from religious side-tracks, and that stands for and definitely teaches, and demonstrates the double cure for sin, will attract and hold the people.

Many of our readers who are scattered abroad will naturally ask: Who were there? To give a complete list of even those whom we know would make a very long list of names.

All of the Reformed Baptist ministers were there except Rev. Henry Smith, Sister Joseph Bullock, although feeble in physical strength, but strong in faith, was in her accustomed place; also Sister Lilly Young sat in her wheel chair in the place she has occupied for many years; her body still crippled, but her face still radiant. Brother and Sister E. Cosman were present part of the time. Brother and Sister Knight of Fredericton were in their usual place. Rev. A. Hartt and Sister Hartt were with us for a few days.

SUPPLEMENTARY FUND FOR THE HIGHWAY.
