## CORRESPONDENCE.

## Port Maitland, N. S., December 12th, 1917.

Dear Highway:

I have not reported through your columns for some time, so take the privilege now. First, I wish to give my testimony which is that I am saved to date and am pressing farther "into the land."

On Oct. 11th the quarterly meeting of this district convened with the church at Sandford. On account of bad weather the quarterly meeting was not largely attended except on Sunday when Rev. H. S. Dow, who had come for the meeting and the special services to follow, preached to large congregations. Rev. H. S. and Mrs. Mullen did not arrive until Monday but in time for the evening service. From the first we enjoyed the presence of God and the church began to take on strength. We continued the services over five Sundays in all, and during the refreshing from the Lord, saw souls converted, backsliders reclaimed and believers sanctified. We all were made to rejoice in God the Rock of our salvation, believing that he will lead us still to greater heights of blessing and love.

On Wednesday, Nov. 14th, began meetings at Port Maitland. Brother Dow and Brother and Sister Mullen were still with us as the special workers. At this place we have not a large congregation of our own people but many others attracted by the gospel in song, as rendered so appreciatively by Brother and Sister Mullen, and the spirit of meeting which gripped their hearts, were in almost constant attendance. The battle was rather a hard one, but God, who give th the increase, was on our side and after a time we realized a signal victory. Sin in its various manifestations found positively no quarter under the clear, scriptural, searching and practical preaching of Brother Dow, who labors for the destruction of sin and that men's faith should not stand in the wisdom of men but in the power of God.

At this meeting a number wept, prayed and believed their way through to God, which was manifest by a shining face and clear, definite testimony. To result in definite know-so experience, there must be the same in preaching (like begets like), and hence we lodge a plea for a sanctified, Spirit-filled ministry which shall "teach others also." There is not any warrant for the use of present day means in the work of soul-saving, rather should the testimony of Paul prove a guide and conviction to us, when to the Romans 15:18 he says, "For I will not dare to speak of any of those things which Christ hath not wrought by me, to make the Gentiles obedient by word and deed." In the days of the early church the servants of Jesus Christ went forth as "witnesses of these things." "And ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth" is the divine order, and is not in any need what-soever of a change in these latter days. "God is not slack concerning his promises"---"but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of him. One brother who had been bound by the "Three Link" chain saw it his privilege and duty to accept deliverance through the power of the Lion of the

tribe of Judah and in words of gladness and praise to God declared himself to be free, quoting John 8:36—"If the Son therefore make you free, ye shall be free indeed." One thing especially helpful in a good meeting is that so many points of Christian experience are brought out, and these give evidence of genuineness and spirit led when Jesus our blessed Potentate is exalted and the crown placed upon his head. "How be it when, the Spirit of truth is come, he will guide you into all truth, for he shall not speak of himself. . . . . He shall glorify me."

Upon the whole we enjoyed exceptionally good weather, and especially for the time of year.

We expect addition to the church in both places and believe that the work accomplished will stand the tests of time and bear much fruit to the glory of God.

Brother Dow did most of the preaching, while Brother and Sister Mullen were always ready with songs and testimony, and together they proved ardent and efficient workers.

As pastor and people we esteem them highly, being glad to obtain such services, and pray that their next meeting, with Rev. C. S. Hilyard at Fort Fairfield, prove a grand success. They need no recommendation for they already have their standing with our churches and people.
