I demurred and said I am altogether unfit for the position, but the men who gathered about me pressed me into the work, and I did the best I could until my conscience utterly rebelled-me, a swearing man with an ungovernable temper, tobacco smoker, theatre going and all round wicked man teaching a class of boys the Bible, that I was altogether out of harmony with.. I considered it rank hypocrisy and J ust had to quit." He is now a Christian man who is doing excellent work with a class of boys that he loves, and who love him, and can safely follow their teacher in all his ways. A good case of salvation makes a safe foundation for the superstructure.

## WHEN WE PRAY THE MONEY COMES.

Where real needs exist the right type of prayer is born and uttered, and the answer comes, if prayer is not answered there is something wrong with it. God knows the heart and its real motive. When we have real financial needs for the work of God, and for the glory of God, the place to go is to headquarters—in prayer, and we know by frequent experiences the motey begins to arrive.
