BIENNIAL MEETING OF CANADIAN BIBLE SOCIETY HELD IN MONT-REAL: BEST YEAR IN HISTORY.

Montreal, April 18.—Forty clerical and lay delegates from all parts of the Dominion and Newfoundland yesterday attended the biennial meeting of the Canadian Bible Society, auxiliary to the British and Foreign Bible Society. They were entertained at luncheon in the Ritz-Carlton Hotel by the Montreal Auxiliary, where 71 guests and local friends shared in the repast, with the Rev. Dr. Johnston in the chair. Mr. N. W. Hoyles, K. C., LL.D., of Toronto, president of the Canadian Bible Society, and other representatives from different provinces, gave addresses-Dr. Christie, of Winnipeg; Rev. G. H. Cobbledick, Lethbridge; Rev. W. H. Thomas, Newfoundland; Rev. H. R. Boyer, St. John, N. B., and Professor Welsh, Montreal.

The report presented to the annual meeting by Rev. W. B. Cooper, General Secretary, was the most encouraging ever received in the history of the Society of Canada. The circulation of Scriptures in many languages in 1916 was 344,855, as compared with 132,633 in 1908, when the Societies were federated, and the total revenue on Bible work was \$184,848.62. The amount remitted to the British and Foreign Bible Society for the year was \$95,000, of which \$40,500 was a free contribution for the parent Society's world wide operations, the balance being on purchase and property account.

It was reported that 300,000 small copies of the New Testament, bound in khaki, had been distributed among Canadian soldiers before leaving for Europe; \$5,000 was set apart for similar purposes this year, and that the regular work of the colporteurs in many parts of the Dominion had been well maintained. The total budget for the current year was fixed at \$55,000. Members of the Board emphasized the ruling aim of the Society, namely, to have the Scriptures taken to homes and put into hands which are not otherwise provided with them, at such a cost to the people as to be within the means of the poor, and at the same time to make the people value the Scriptures more than if given away free. The attention of all Protestant churches was called to the fact that their foreign missions in almost all lands draw translations and supplies of the Bible from the Bible Society largely at its cost, and Synods, Assemblies, Conferences and congregations were respectfully urged to provide for the allocation to the Bible Society of ten per cent. of all their contribution to foreign missionary work grows, the heavier is the debt they incur to the Bible Society, it being a partner in all missionary causes. The cost of the Society's operations cover both missionary distribution and expenses of administration.

A letter was received from Ralph Connor (Dr. G. W. Gordon, of Winnipeg), at the front, where he has been acting chaplain, expressing the high appreciation of the soldiers of the New Testaments put in their hands, saying, "Almost every boy carries a Bible or New Testament, which they love to pull out at our service and

which I konw they often read in the trenches. A lad I buried not long ago spent the last few moments of his life in his dugout reading a chapter of the Bible, just before he went out to meet his death in the front line by a sniper's bullet. The Bible brings them great and steadying thoughts, gives them cheering comfort, and the Society is doing an inestimable work, whose value is summed up only in the arithmetic of eternity."
