Mrs. P. W. Caldwell.

George Z. Parlee.

The death of Mr. George Z. Parlee occurred at the home of his son, Arthur S. Parlee, at 10 a. m., June 12th. Mr. Parlee was formerly from Apohaqui, Kings Co., N. B., where he lived for many years; he was a member of the Free Baptist Church, Lower Millstream, N. B., and was acquainted with the old veterans of the Free Baptist denomination. His home was one for ministers with whom he liked to associate and was a regular attendant and supporter of the church until disabled, after which he found great consolation in meditating on the hymns and texts he had memorized in the past. He always remembered the Sabbath, though unable to attend service and confessed that his trust was in Christ whom we know if it was steadfast would receive him into the mansions above. Mr. Parlee was 85 years and 3 months and leaves to mourn two sons, Arthur S., of Halifax, with whom he made his home until his death, also Herbert B., who is attached to the 62nd regiment now in St. John. A short service was held in the home conducted by Rev. Mr. Daley, after which the remains were taken to Apohaqui and service was held there. The Rev. Gideon Swim officiated. I am sure the mourners have the sympathy of all Highway readers in their bereavement.
